FUNERAL MR. SNOW LARGELY ATTENDED

Services For Well Known High Point Citizen Held Yesterday Afternoon In That City.

(Special to Daily News.) High Point, March 22.—Under a bright spring sky, which was symbolic of the life and character of the deceased, funeral services over the remains of E. A. Snow were conducted this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock from the first Presbyterian church of which he had been a substantial and lifelong member. The auditorium of the church was packed with friends and relatives of the deceased and the lawn thronged with sorrowing people from all walks of life. It was one of the largest gatherings of citizens in the history of the city to pay their last tribute of respect to the memory of a beloved citizen.

The services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. C. P. Coble assisted by Rev. W. A. Lambeth, pastor of Wesley Memorial Methodist church. Music was rendered by a quartette of male voices. The floral designs were many and beautiful, bearing testimony to the good name which the deceased bore among his fellowmen. Pallbearers were selected from Mr. Snow's Sunday school class, which he had taught for several years, giving it up only a few weeks ago when he became seriously ill. DEATH OF W. P. CRAVEN

Numbered Among the Saddest Deaths Ever Occurred in this Community Late in the afternoon of December 18, he arrived at the home of Ashworth Mason, which is about five or six miles northeast of Randeman, to carry home some of his friends who had been rabbit hunting that afternoon and were just coming in from the hunt. There being plenty of game and knowing his fondness for hunting, he was invited to take a short round before starting for home. They had gone but a short distance from the house when the fatal shot was fired accidentally by a friend, who was in the act of picking up a rabbit he had just killed. It is thought that the gun hammer was caught in some briars, causing the discharge. Medical aid was quickly obtained and he was hurried to St. Leo's hospital, Greensboro. From the nature of the wound little hope was felt for his recovery, although everything possible was done to save his life. Not in the experience of those who attended him, and the physicians who operated on him was there ever a patient who showed less concern for himself and thought more of others than he did. When he was laid on the operating table for the last time and told there was little hope for him, he talked on his condition without a murmur, and when asked if there was anything between him and God, he replied with that characteristic expression of his "Not a thing."

Realizing that death was certain he prayed for his friends and associates at home, pleading for them to live right, and requested that his wife deliver a warning to them that they might be ready should they be cut down as he was. At length on the morning of December 14th, after five days of untold suffering, he met death with that same dauntless Christian courage that had been continually creeping out through his daily life. He was born August 27th, 1880, at Cedar Falls, the son of Christian parents, who raised him "in the way he should go," and when he became grown "he did not depart from it." Before he was fourteen years of age he became converted and joined the M. P. church and until his death was an active worker, always ready to stand up for the right. He is survived by a widow, father and mother, five sisters and one brother. A host of friends sympathize with his relatives in their sorrow.

Surviving also are the husband and two sisters, Mrs. Clay Dorsett, of Trinity, and Mrs. W. S. Anderson, of Lexington, and one brother, W. F. Harris, of Lexington.

# THE WAR IS OVER.

## GERMANY HAS SIGNED THE ALLIES TERMS OF SURRENDER.

THE END CAME AT 6 A. M., MONDAY, NOVEMBER, 11, 1918.

Four Years of Battle That Have Brought Death, Ruin, Debt and Destruction to a Greater Part of Europe, Was Ended When the Armistice Was Signed--The Kaiser Abdicates--Germany's New Head--The President Reads the Armistice to Congress--Revolt and Anarchy Abound.

Washington, Nov. 11.--The world war ended this morning at 6 o'clock Washington, 11 o'clock Paris time. The armistice was signed by the German representatives at midnight. This announcement was made by the state department at 2:50 o'clock this morning.

Joshua Hill, late of the estate of land to David David, William Jones and Isaac Coltrane December 14, 1867, for the establishment of Poplar Ridge Friends meeting house. Some time later the school was moved to the county school building nearby.

## Poplar Ridge

In 1906 J. Newton Farlow made request to Marlborough quarterly meeting to set up a monthly meeting at Poplar Ridge. After some discussion in the meeting it was granted and the meeting set up, after which John F. Beeson and Jones C. Yunnannan, overseers of Marlborough monthly meeting of Poplar Ridge, decided the land to the trustees of Poplar Ridge monthly meeting August 22, 1908.

At the setting up of the first monthly meeting, September 14, 1906, there were 30 charter members. It was in the first old meeting house and continued there until 1912. Then the second meeting house was erected just across the road from the old one. Through the good works of Margaret Farlow and Cora Lee Gardner, our present pastor, our church membership has increased to 106 and the old meeting house would not accommodate the congregation and members, and in 1938 a new meeting house was erected near where the first one once stood.

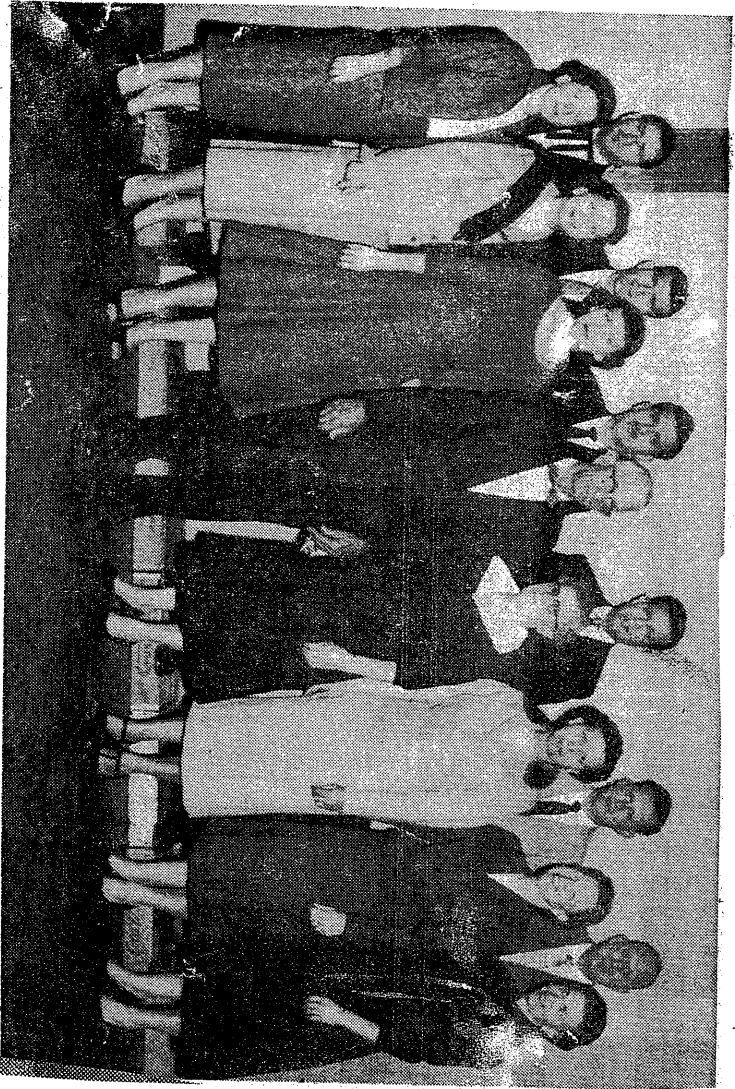

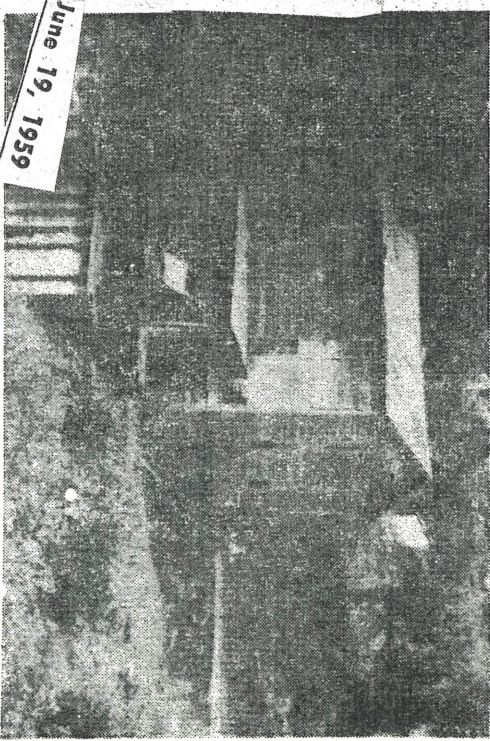

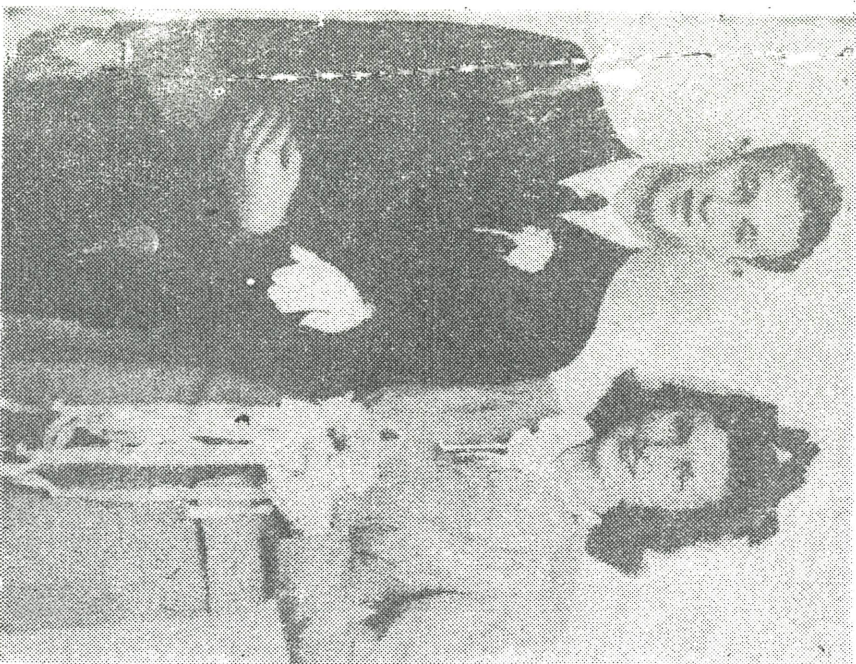
### Joseph C. Hockett Dead

In July, 1918, she resigned from the Archdale charge in order to devote more time to Springfield.

She was also chairman of the interracial relations committee of the North Carolina Yearly Meeting, Society of Friends, and was very active in this work in North Carolina. An interest in which Miss Cox took an active leadership was that of public welfare. Many years before any organization was set up here to cope with welfare and other social problems, she assumed the task of alleviating and improving conditions here which she knew existed to the detriment of the citizens and the community. It was she who was instrumental in the setting up of public welfare agencies in High Point, and in recognition of her untiring efforts she was elected to the office of chairman for many years.

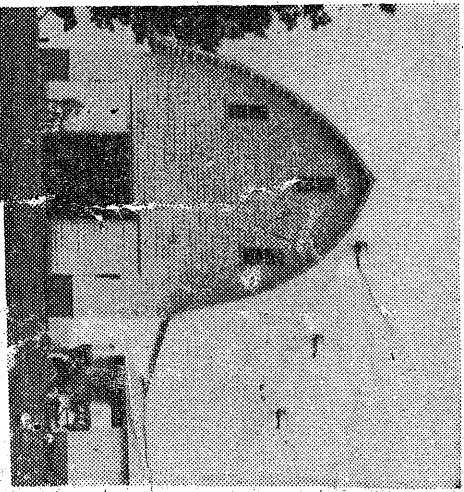
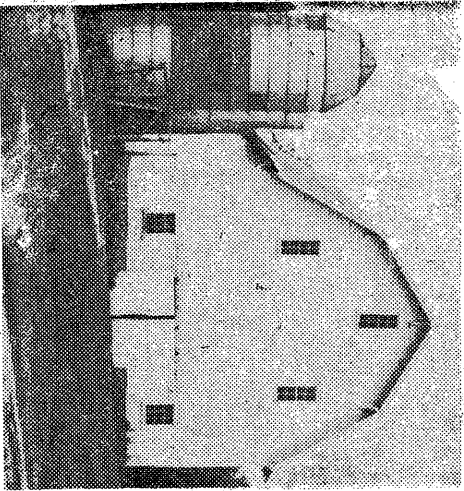

# He's Farmer And Barn-Builder, But Genealogy Is His Hobby

**SNOW CAMP, May 28.**—"My wife accuses me of giving more attention to the dead than to the living," says Harvey Newlin, farmer and barn-builder, whose hobby is genealogy. He lives in South Alamance County and has made an extensive study to trace histories of families in this area. To compile information he has traveled and corresponded widely.

"I was always interested in people," he recollects. "As a child I used to sit up late at night and listen to the talk about 'old times' was able to find out who my great grandfather was, but no further back. I used to think, 'If I just knew who his parents were. That got me interested in genealogy.'"

**Wanted The Truth**

However, real work in family histories started in 1912. "I saw a letter," he continues, "in which it was stated that five distinct groups of Newlins in Indiana were racing their ancestry back to a man who I knew had had no children—he had never been married. This intensified my interest. I wanted to know the truth."

He has traced the Newlin family's far back as 1682, the year in which Nicholas and Elizabeth Newlin received a certificate of removal from the Friends meeting of Millie, Ireland, before leaving for America. They settled in Chester County, Pennsylvania.

"Tracing a family history may take a long time," Harvey explains. The process may be long and tedious. Family Bibles often contain needed data. If they are Quakers he can get a great deal of information from Quaker writings. Records of marriage, births and deaths were kept by the meeting. The Cane Creek records have been a valuable source of information.

papers found in county courthouses may hold the clues necessary to make a chart. Or it may be old letters in the bottom of a trunk overlooked for years.

Listening to people's anecdotes may prove helpful. If enough people tell the same story, then it is acceptable. However, many people have been misinformed and do not realize it. "I'm always having someone tell me that he knows some of my family history. It seems there were three brothers, they began, 'who came to America on the Mayflower. After landing, one stayed in the North, another came to the South, and the third left for the West.'"

**Those Mayflower Claims**

"The Mayflower," Harvey remarks dryly, "would have had to be quite a ship to take care of all those ancestors. I know of only one family I would believe if they made the Mayflower claim."

Harvey Newlin has an astonishingly accurate memory. Birth, death and other dates give his stories exact settings—and he knows enough stories to fill a large volume. He tells of the time, years ago, when someone asked him how he could remember so much. Before he was able to answer, his little daughter, Mary, piped up: "Oh, it's not hard—that's all he thinks about."

He married Nannie Gutberle and they reared five children. He has developed the farm which a friend told him when he bought it, had such thin soil that a cocklebur would not scratch through it. 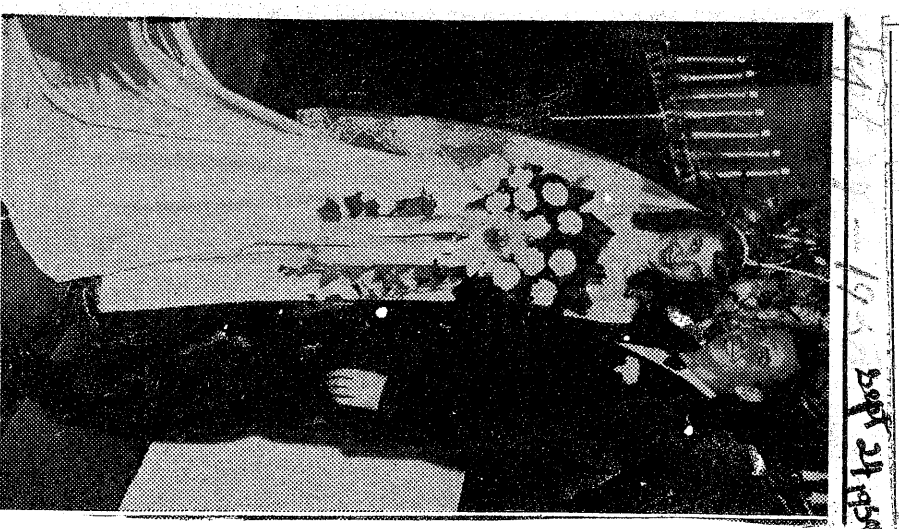

The chicks seem to be comfortable under his homemade brooder. Fresh litter is placed under the chicks every day and the water is changed three times a day.

This adds up to a great deal of work for Mr. and Mrs. Brown, but it's the kind of work they have been doing for the last twenty-six years since Mr. Brown retired as a newspaper correspondent for Delaware and Maryland papers and came to High Point to live.

They like the work and are willing to spend long hours tending their flock. But, whatever the reasons may be for their success in egg production, the fact remains that they sell just about the largest hen eggs ever seen

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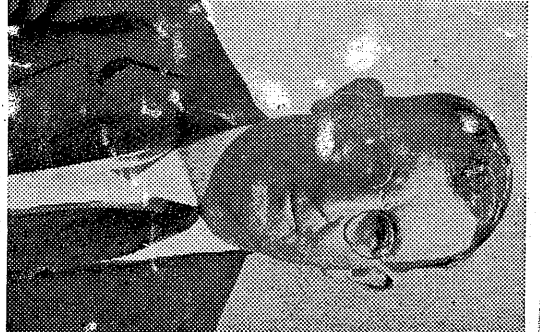

**Overman And Wife Given Two Years At Hard Labor Similar Suspended Sentence Can Be Imposed In 5 Years**

Clarence Overman and his wife, Rita Schneider Overman, of near Liberty, pleaded guilty in Randolph superior court Tuesday to criminal neglect of 2-year-old Mary Overman, remains of whose burned body were found near the Overman home after the child's mysterious disappearance had aroused Judge Peyton McSwain of Shelby, commenting that in his own mind he is convinced the Overmans killed the child although evidence now in the hands of officers might not prove it, gave the parents the maximum sentences under the law on the neglect charges.

The judge sentenced both Clarence Overman and his wife to serve two years at hard labor, the man on the roads and the woman in the state penitentiary. The judge ordered that the two remaining Overman children be removed from the custody of the Overmans and shall remain under the supervision of the Randolph welfare department.

To insure the Overmans' good behavior and compliance with the court's instructions not to molest the two children placed in charge of the welfare department, Judge McSwain gave both the father and the mother an additional two-year suspended sentence on another neglect charge. The suspended sentences will remain over the defendants' heads after they are released from serving their immediate terms, and can be ordered into effect by the solicitor at any time within five years.

The Overman case, scheduled for Thursday on the court calendar, was called unexpectedly Tuesday afternoon. Most of the witnesses in the Overman case, summoned to appear in court Thursday, were not in court when the case was disposed of Tuesday.

Defense Attorney J. L. Moody of Silver City, entered plea of guilty for Overman and his wife on two charges each of criminal neglect of their children. No action was taken regarding a murder charge filed against the couple, since the prosecution apparently felt the evidence now in hand was insufficient.

In passing sentence, Judge McSwain expressed his opinion that if the evidence in hand is not sufficient to prove murder, it is sufficient to raise a strong suspicion of murder. The judge added that he hopes law enforcement officers will endeavor their efforts to ferret out evidence to bring the Overmans to trial on the murder charge.

After the man and woman entered pleas of guilty to the charges of criminal neglect, Superintendent James E. Burgess of the Randolph welfare department was called to the witness stand to review the facts of the case as disclosed by his department's investigation. In addition to reviewing previously disclosed evidence, the welfare superintendent disclosed one or two additional facts, uncovered by his department's continuing work on the case.

One fact was considered a possible explanation of the apparent hostility of both Clarence Overman and his wife toward the 2-year-old child, Mary. A formal statement from Bernadine I. Healey, senior case worker of the Bureau of Public Welfare of Cook county, Illinois, who investigated the Overmans, was read.

The infant nearly was left for a while in agents' hands.

Records show that the baby Mary Overman weighed six pounds 15 ounces at birth, in August, 1946, and weighed 15 pounds when discharged to the mother in June, 1947, shortly before the Overmans left Chicago and went to Liberty.

Testimony in superior court Tuesday mentioned that the family of Alley Bowman, who live about 600 yards from the Overman home, were strongly impressed by a nauseating smell of something burning February 20, two days before Overman and his wife were arrested. Bowman was quoted as saying that the only time in his life he had ever smelled a similar odor was once when a barn burned and some live-stock was burned in the fire.

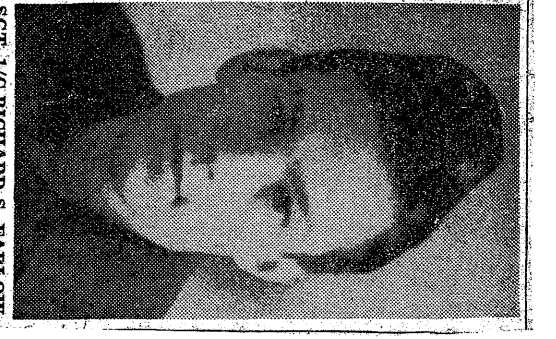

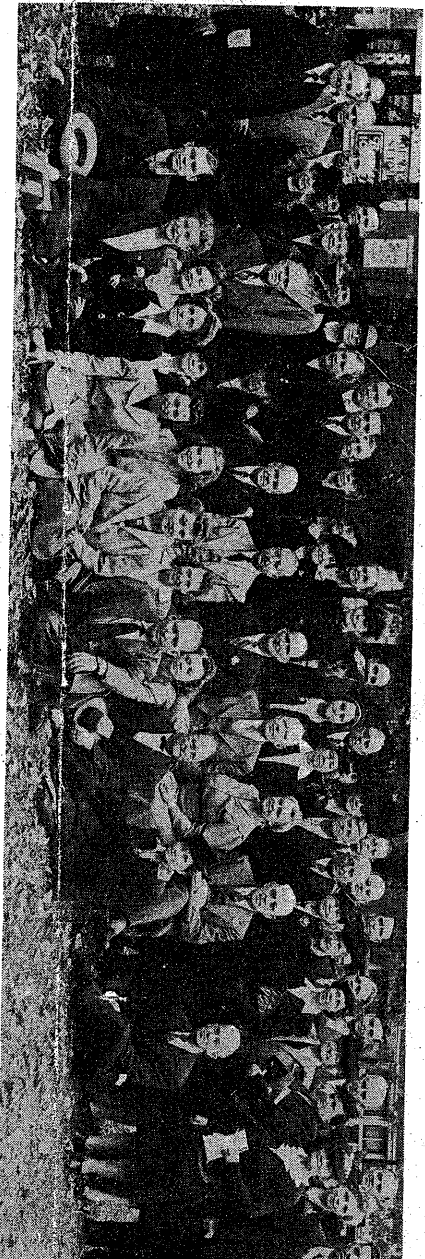

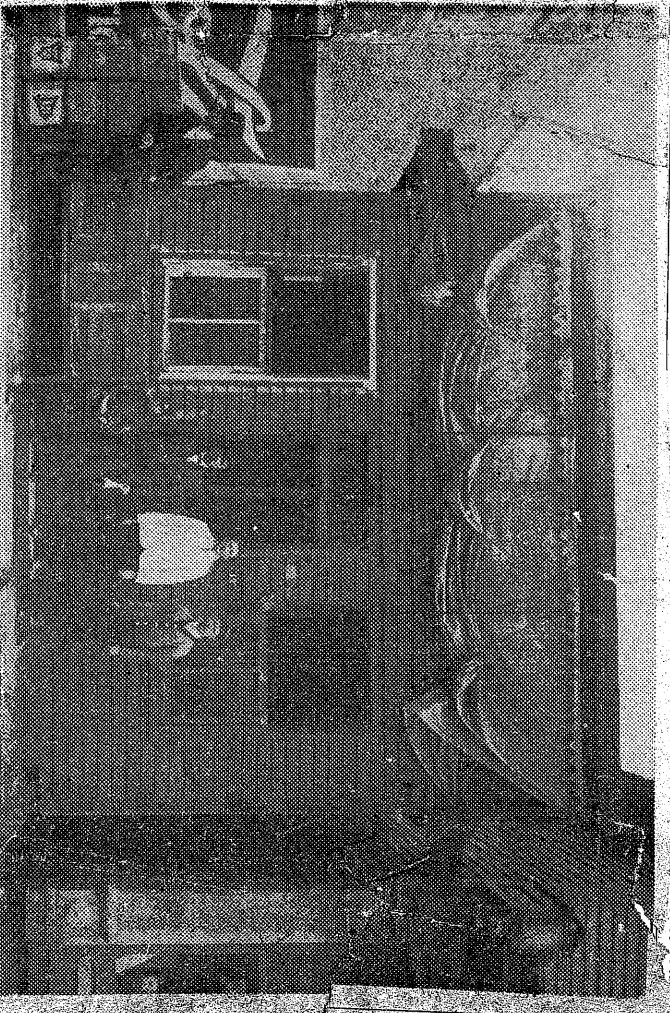
That night Farlow remained with a large number of his unarmed comrades, fought off an enemy attack, and successfully brought them through enemy lines to safety.

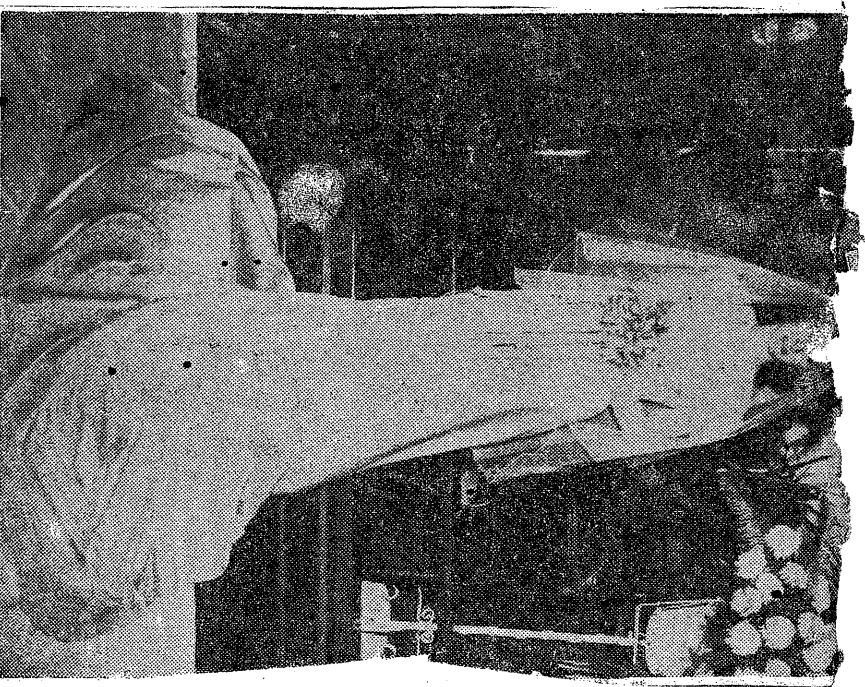

and five thousand and that's enough for me," Dr. Bulla said. But in his day, Dr. Bulla has tackled all kinds of cases and believed he has had just as many varied experiences if not more than the average doctor. When he first began his practice and for a number of years hence, major operations were considered virtual murder.

Early in his career Dr. Bulla performed an operation on his brother's boy. An appendectomy was practically unheard of then, and Dr. Bulla had never seen one performed before but he went ahead and completed a successful operation. "The patient is still living," Dr. Bulla said, to indicate that his operation apparently did no harm.

Dr. Bulla said, "I'm going to visit the sick as long as I can drive a Ford and I'm going hunting as long as I can raise a gun to my shoulders." When he first started his medical practice, Dr. Bulla made his rounds on horseback later wore out two two-wheeled carts and three Babcock bugles. Then, he chugged around Randolph in a model T. Ford for a while, bought another and then a model A. Dr. Bulla is presently on his third V-8 Ford.

Asked how many patients he would estimate he had ministered to, Dr. Bulla said, "Oh, my lord, I couldn't tell. Up in the millions I suppose."

The Randolph doctor's practice has by no means been limited to the neighborhood in which he lives. Folks have come from far and wide to consult with Dr. Bulla about their ailments. He has been particularly successful with the treatment of various skin diseases, allergies and fungus growths. In many instances he prepares his own medicine for the cure of such disorders. In addition to dispensing medicine from his own home, he writes prescriptions for drug store preparations.

Dr. Bulla is well known in the Randolph community and is also respected throughout the state by those who have come in contact with him either as patients or as members of the same profession. Looking back over his career Dr. Bulla missed for a moment and said, "I have done about everything a man could do in my life time including cutting wheat with a cradle, splitting rails, farming, hunting, fishing and practicing medicine. He recalled, "I never made over a dollar a day until I started medical practice."

At fifteen years of age he was a crop ion wheat cutter of a sort. "There is one thing I could brag on that's it," Dr. Bulla recalled.

A member of Mt. Vernon church for 40 years, Dr. Bulla has seen his church grow along with his community. He likes to be close to the soil and near those who depend on the soil for a living. His formula for longevity and good health at his age is hard work and a temperant life. Straight of carriage and quick of wit, Dr. Bulla appears to be far younger than his years. And though he may not be a great man to the world, to those who have called Dr. Bulla when they were sick and found the country doctor always ready to hitch up the horses or crank up the Model-T, he has been a real friend in need and a man of great heart and spirit.

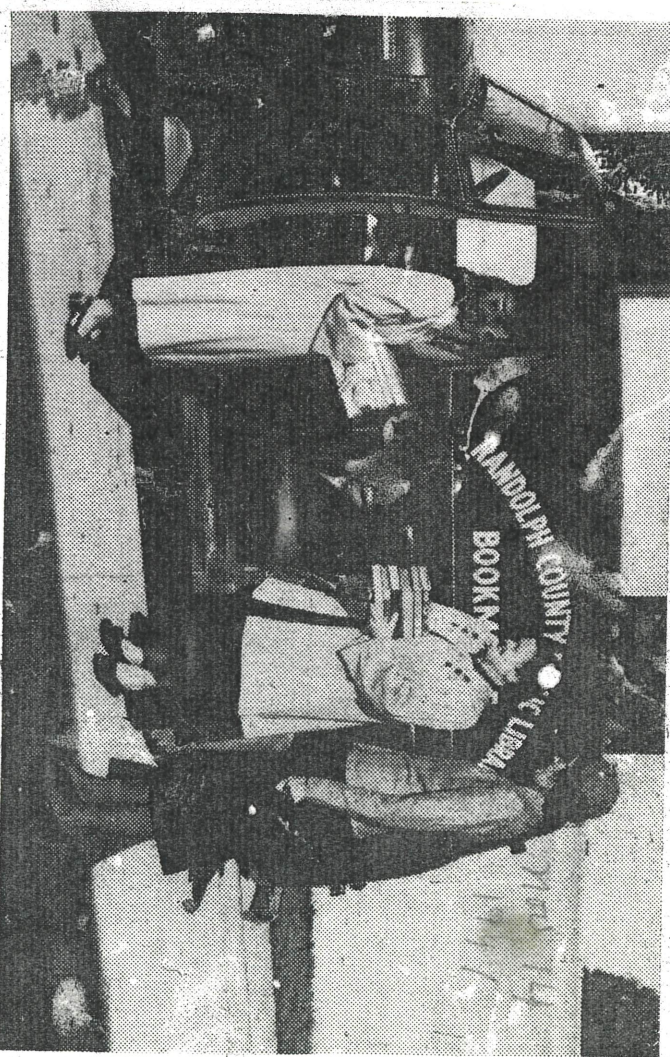

## Charlotte Methodist Church Organized In 1870, 35 Members

The earliest records of Charlotte Methodist church do not reveal the date of the beginning of worship but it is known that services were held before the Civil war in a brush arbor.

In 1870 services were held in the school building and the church was organized under the leadership of Rev. W. C. Kenneth with 35 charter members.

While services were still being held in the school house a big revival service was held and Jackson, Talley and his wife, Elizabeth, made a deed of two and one-half acres of land to be used for the site of the church. The deed was made to the first trustees, William Jackson Talley, Peter Vunnamon and Watson W. Redding.

The first church was erected during the months of August, September and October of 1872, at a cost of \$342.85. Lumber for the church was sawed and hauled by T. Winborne Andrews and his sons, who with others united their efforts in the erection of the church. This church was used until 1901 when it was sold to some negroes who moved it to Ashboro and today it is still used as a place of worship, located near the Bossong Hosley mills.

The first person to be buried in the cemetery was Peter Vunnamon's sister, Mary Vunnamon, who died in March 1873. She was carried to the church by Jonathan Steed in a two horse wagon.

The Bible, which is still in use in the church, was purchased by two sisters whose names are unknown. The Bible was rebound a few years ago.

by Mrs. Richardson of Ashboro. In the spring of 1901 the present church building was built and a little later was dedicated by the late Dr. R. M. Andrews.

Down through the years the church has always been alert to steps of progress and has kept pace with other rural churches in the county.

In 1932 a Delco lighting system was donated by Henry Bulla and was used until electricity was available in 1936.

In 1933 the Ladies Auxiliary of the church bought a piano for the church and have also done many other worthwhile things for the interest of the church.

In 1936 an offer was made by the late D. B. McCrary to the church in which he agreed to deed some extra land to the church property to increase the much needed cemetery space. On August 11, 1936 Mr. McCrary and his wife, Allie W. McCrary, made a deed to the trustees, D. T. McCain, T. V. Bulla, A. C. Bulla, Ray McCain and T. T. Redding for this purpose. The church was then moved to the present site, which gave an increase of one and a half acres.

In that same year mantle

trees were set out by Grady Richardson and the slate work was made possible through the Ladies Auxiliary. Lights were also installed during the year.

The next major improvement was the building of six new classrooms which were erected in 1938 at a cost of \$1,300. By December 31, 1939 the indebtedness was paid in full.

During the fall of 1945 an oil burning heating system was installed at a cost of \$1,250.

Then in 1947 the interior of the church was redecorated and all indebtedness was soon taken care of.

The carpeting on the aisles was donated by Jim Bulla in 1948.

This collection of facts is only the material accomplishment which the church has made through the years, however, the church is justly proud of the men and women who have gone out from its in-

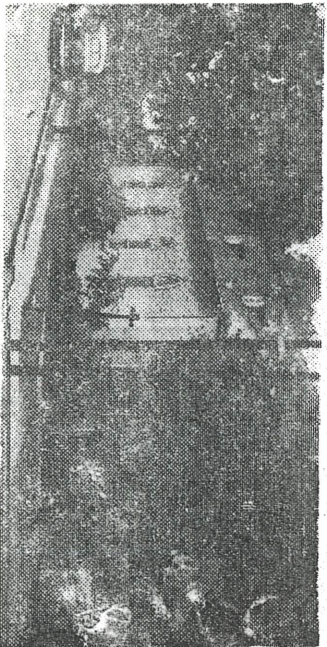

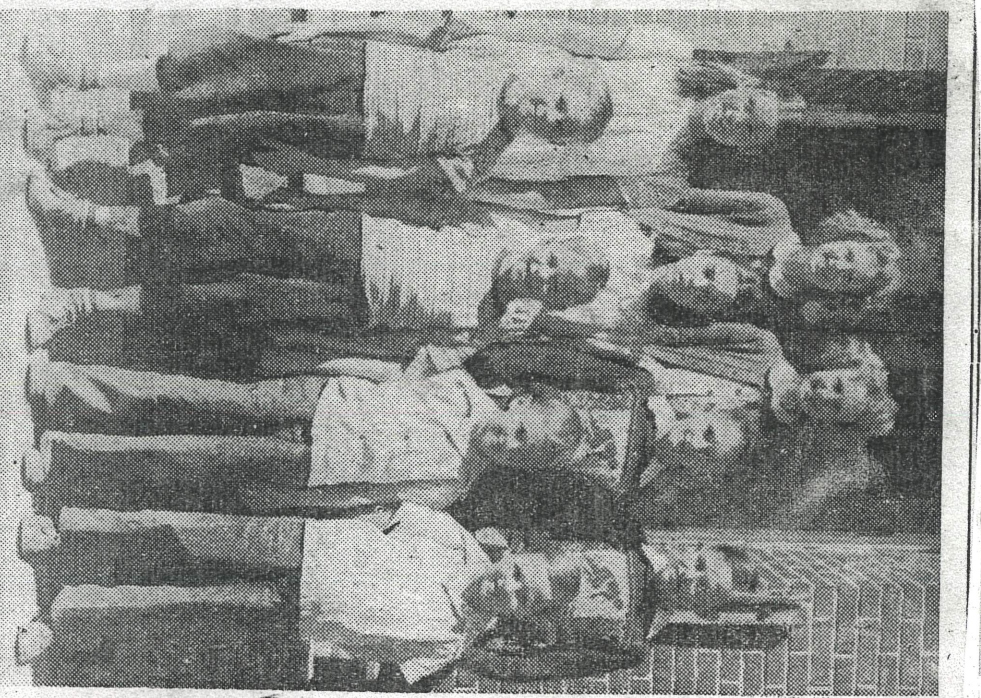

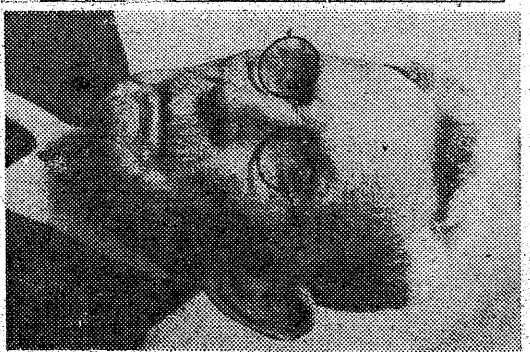

William Frank Redding, 82, prominent, retired business man of Asheboro, pioneer Republican leader and former Randolph county sheriff, died at 8:20 last night at Randolph hospital. He was 82 years of age. Death followed a heart attack a week ago. He had been in failing health during the past few years.

The funeral will be conducted at 5 p. m. Friday at the Central Methodist church by the pastor, Rev. Mark Q. Turley, assisted by Dr. J. E. Pritchard and Dr. S. W. Taylor. Burial will follow in Asheboro cemetery. The body will be carried to the church an hour and a half before the service.

Mr. Redding was born February 8, 1866, three miles west of Asheboro, son of the late Thomas and Eliza Steed Peabbling. In his early years he was in the lumber and furniture business. Since 1907 he had been engaged in the milling business and at the time of his death was president of the Southern Crown Milling Company.

He was elected to the first board of directors of the First National Bank when the bank was organized in 1905, and at the time of his death was vice president. He was elected to the first board of directors of the Peoples Building and Loan Association, and served on the board until his death.

Mr. Redding was one of the original members of the Methodist Protestant church, which is now the Central Methodist church, and served as a church trustee.

He was a former member of the Asheboro city council. He was elected sheriff of Randolph county about the turn of the century, and served in that office for three terms. For many years Mr. Redding was an active participant in Asheboro's civic, social, religious and political affairs.

He was a member of the original board of directors of the Randolph hospital, and served on the board until his death. He was a member of the Asheboro Rotary club.

**RANDOLPH**—A friend has sent me word that she desires to tell me about Randolph county. Now at the first opportunity I shall certainly visit that friend and get as many facts as possible about the county that has contributed so much that is worthy to the history and life of the people of North Carolina. Down in Chatham, I once talked with a citizen and told him that all over the state I had met fine, upstanding men who claimed they hailed from his county. "Why yes," he replied, "it's a fine county to be born in and go out from."

In years past I heard practically the same remark made about Randolph county. Both Chatham and Randolph are now among the progressive counties of the state. A remark about Chatham rabbits is rather out of place in these modern days, and talk of Randolph's wonderful schools of the past century is decidedly outmoded, since that county now has far better school buildings, equipment and facilities than it ever had before.

To be sure, teachers make the schools but I'm told that Randolph is right up in the forefront when it comes to the quality of teaching. As sturdy as the Uwharrie hills, honest and persevering, many Randolph citizens can trace their ancestry to pre-Revolution families, and a visit to such communities as that at Marlboro church, causes one to marvel at the names of men of English and Scotch descent who labored in the section two centuries ago. It is not a matter of thinking on the tender grace of a day that is dead, but rather of origins of those beginnings that have their impact on the Randolph we know today.

## Big Rattlesnake Killed On Canopy Farm Near Sophia

Having nothing better, he picked up a stick that was not as large as the snake, and succeeded in killing the reptile with that.

It was not the first rattlesnake he had seen this summer. About a month ago he killed one found by his dog.

That's what you find when you start looking for the names of High Point streets.

Street names cover every category of description, but a majority of the specialized ones are either presidents' names or trees.

In the former, you can find Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Hamilton, Madison, Monroe, Van Buren, Taylor, Johnson, Grant, Coolidge, Cleveland, McKinley, Harrison and Hoover. Passed over are Lincoln, Wilson, Roosevelt, and even Truman.

The "tree" streets are almost endless. Go out for a ride about Pine, Elm, Oak, Cedar, Walnut, Spruce, Magnolia, Maple, Chestnut, Ash, Rosewood, Greenwood, Balsam, Dogwood, Peachtree, and Myrtle. To take care of any missed, there's an Evergreen.

A stranger in town, armed only with a Street Locations book from the Chamber of Commerce, might conceivably get somewhat confused. If he had only the word "green" in mind, he would have to search Greenwood avenue, Greenway drive, Greenview terrace, the Greensboro road and just plain Green street.

If his objective was Teague street, he would really get confused:

The street locations supplement shows Teague street to run from Beverly road to Artisan street, Beverly goes from Teague to Front street, and Artisan from Beverly to Teague. 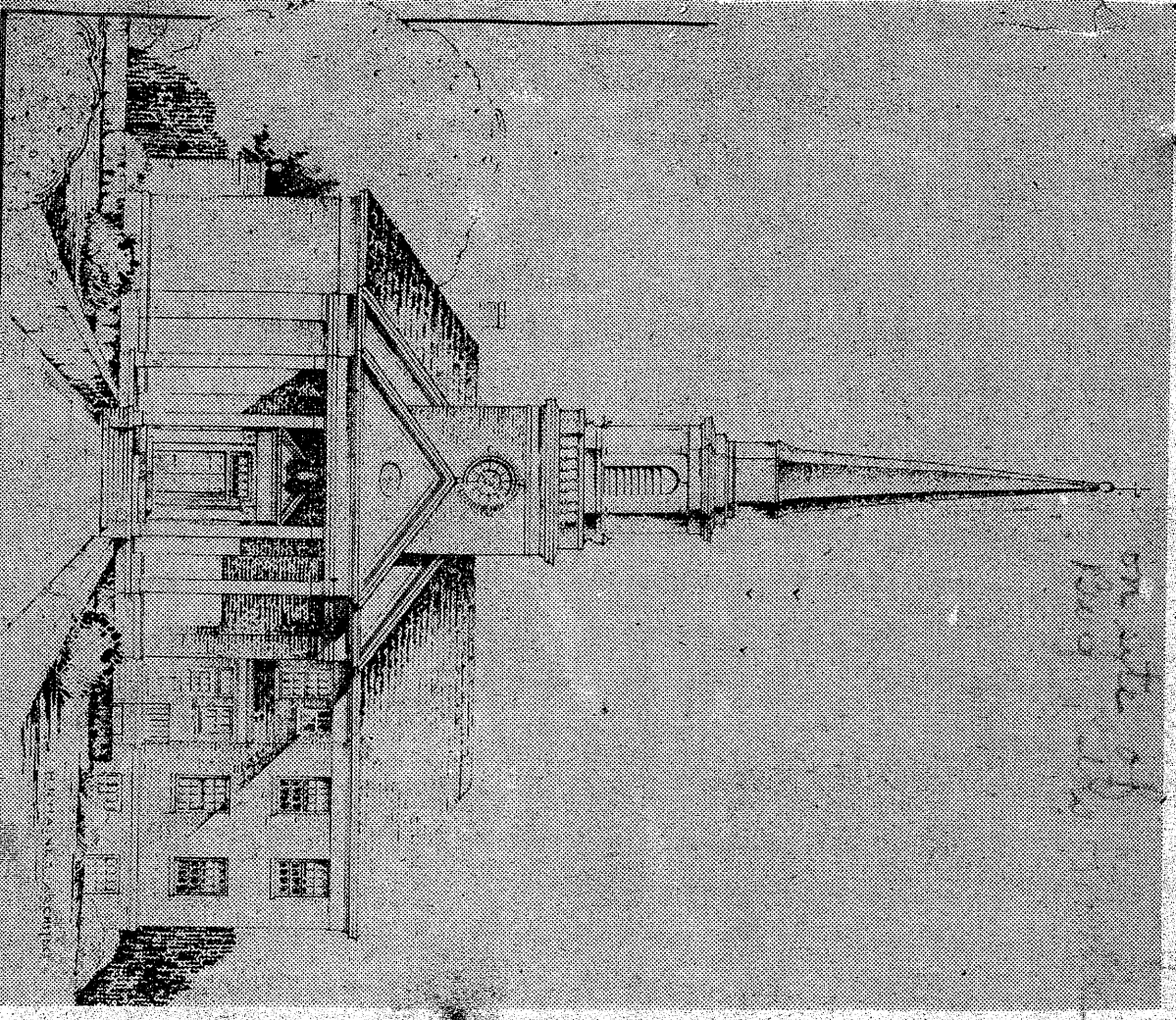

# Randleman Man Hangs Self In County Jail

Ralph B. Russell, 56, of Randleman was found dead in the Randolph county jail at 5:45 p. m. Thursday, slightly more than two hours after he had been jailed on a charge of drunkenness.

The body was found hanging in a cell. Dr. J. L. Fritz, Asheboro physician called in the absence of Coroner T. R. Farlow was quoted as saying the man had been dead only a short while.

Sheriff Ben F. Morgan said Russell hanged himself with his belt. The body was found hanging beside a lavatory in the cell. It appeared that Russell had stood upon the lavatory, tied the belt to a bar overhead, placed the noose around his neck, and stepped off.

When found, his body was brushing against the lavatory. Death apparently resulted from choking or strangling. Sheriff Morgan said, since the man's neck was not broken.

There were only three prisoners in the jail at the time the suicide hanging occurred. The sheriff said. Russell was the only prisoner in the cell block where the tragedy took place.

Miss Betty Lassiter, daughter of Jailer W. P. Lassiter, discovered the body when she went to Russell's cell to ask when if he felt able to eat supper. The sheriff said that Russell had apparently been intoxicated for some time when he was placed in jail about 2:30 p. m.

Miss Lassiter said the was motionless and appeared dead when she discovered it. She believed Russell had been alive 20 minutes. So far as could be determined here, the suicide was the first fatality ever to occur in the jail.

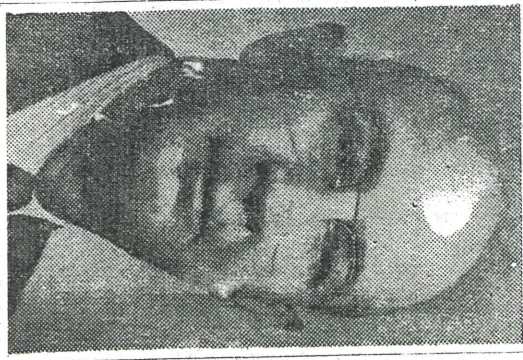

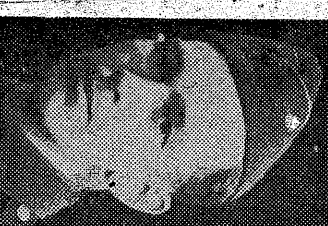
## T. R. Burgess Died Monday In Ramsour Area

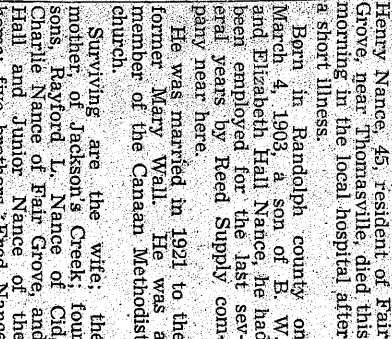

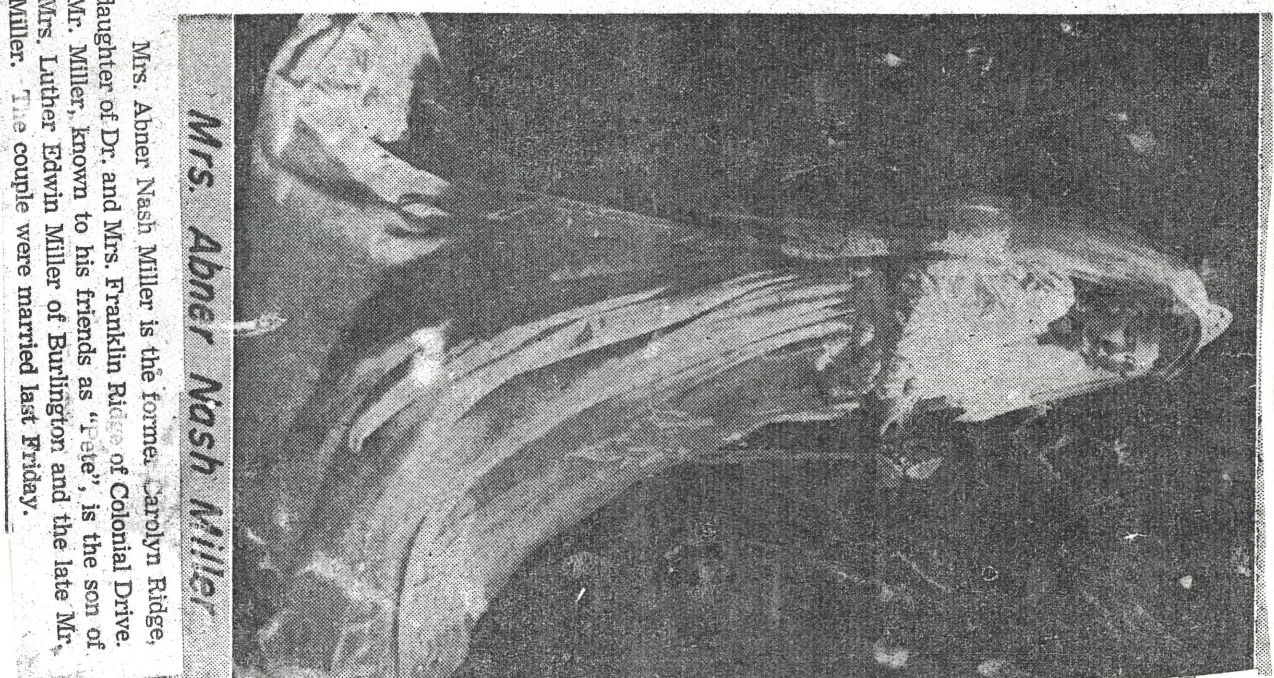
