

Trinity Teacher May Have Record For Service In Same Class, School

A Route 1, Trinity woman, Miss Virginia Redding, is in her 35th year as a 5th grade teacher at the Trinity school.

This is perhaps the longest continuous record at the same school and with the same grade of any teacher in the Randolph county school system and perhaps at any school in this section of the state, local school authorities say.

Miss Redding actually began teaching 52 years ago at the Carraway school, which was located diagonally across the road from the home in which she grew up and the school which she herself attended as a young girl. This school has since been discontinued.

She taught at the Carraway school for 13 years and then quit teaching for five years because of the illness of her mother. Upon the death of her mother in 1925, she began teaching at the Trinity school where she has seen continuous service since that time.

When she went to Trinity, there was only one building and only one elementary teacher to a grade. She remembers that she had 48 students in the 5th grade her first year there. The principal was R. D. Marsh of Marshville.

Since that time, a high school building has been added, also a home economics building, a cafeteria, a gymnasium and an agricultural building. There are now 25 elementary teachers and Miss Redding says that she only has 32 students in her 5th grade this year.

Miss Redding is a tall woman with an erect carriage and shows no signs of weariness from the duties of teaching which have stretched across more than a half of a century. This is evident despite the fact that two years ago she underwent operations for the removal of a wart.

When the family moved to Route 1, Trinity, Miss Redding attended the Carraway school near her home, which was at that time a one-teacher school and the school at which she was later to begin her teaching career.

After leaving the Carraway school, she attended Guilford College for two years and then attended Woman's College at Greensboro. Following her attendance at the college in Greensboro, she began teaching at the Carraway school which by that time had become a two-teacher school.

Although she never did receive her college degree, she attended summer school sessions at Appalachian State teachers College at Boone and the University of Tennessee and took various extension courses which enabled her to gain the highest certification possible in her profession.

Methods of teaching have changed drastically during the years of her teaching but Miss Redding says that "you still can't get around the old fundamentals of the three R's, Reading, Riting and Rithmetic."

Three generations of students have passed through her classrooms and one of her students is a great-grandmother. In quiet humor, Miss Redding says that often one of her students will say "my grandpa went to school to you" or "my grandma went to school to you." She also stated that on a recent Sunday church, she noticed that every person in the congregation had either went to school to her or some of their people had.

She is a lifelong attendant of Mt. Vernon Methodist church which is located near to her home. When the church took over the old Carraway school

facts from both of her eyes. In fact, she only lost one month of teaching from the ailment with which she was afflicted. Last year she did not miss a day of school and also has not missed a day thus far for this school year.

Miss Redding was born in abernacle township in the vicinity of the Hoover Hill Gold Mine, about three or four miles north of Highway 64. Her parents were John Stanley and Genia Andrew Redding. Her father was a farmer and the use in which she was born is a large two-story log structure which has now practically been taken to the ground, with the age chimneys which was located at each end of the house still standing.

She was the youngest of five children and the only one still living. Her brothers were T. Redding and J. C. Redding, Asheville, and Charles W. Redding, of Route 1, Trinity, whose home she now resides, and her sister was Mrs. Bert Blair, who lived at Frazer's Sliding, in the vicinity of Archdale and Trinity, and who was the former Oclanansia Redding.

A very small child, Miss Redding attended the Mt. Pleasant school which was located in Hoover Hill Gold Mine vicinity, and she attended there until she was a one-teacher school, in the Mt. Vernon community, with the house in which they lived still standing.

Joining the home in which she now lives with her husband, Mr. Charles W. Redding, and with her nephew, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas King, and their three children, Miss Redding was a very small child, Miss Redding attended the Mt. Pleasant school which was located in Hoover Hill Gold Mine vicinity, and she attended there until she was a one-teacher school, in the Mt. REV. JAMES H. GREEN Succumbs at 74

James Green, Bible College Founder, Dies

The Rev. James H. Green, 74, founder and president-emeritus of People's Bible School and College, died last night at his home, 2100 Boulevard St.

He was reared in Watauga County. He taught school for a number of years before entering the Methodist ministry while still a young man.

The Rev. Mr. Green served numerous pastorates in the Western North Carolina Conference.

He was active in evangelistic work throughout his ministry. For many years he operated Camp Free, an old-fashioned camp meeting at Rutherford College, midway between Hickory and Morganton.

Founded in 1932

In 1932, he founded People's Bible School on Silver Avenue in Greensboro. Later, he moved the school to its present location on Boulevard Street, one mile west of the city limits.

For 20 years he served as president of the school, before illness forced him to retire. On his retirement he became president emeritus.

He was also founder of the People's Methodist Church and was president of the People's Methodist Conference, until his retirement.

He conducted a Sunday radio program here until his death.

Survivors include three sons, James C. and John Klige Green of Greensboro, and Chaplain Phillip I. Green of Madrid, Spain; two daughters, Mrs. Max Kimmins and Mrs. W. P. Armstrong and a number of great-grandchildren.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete.

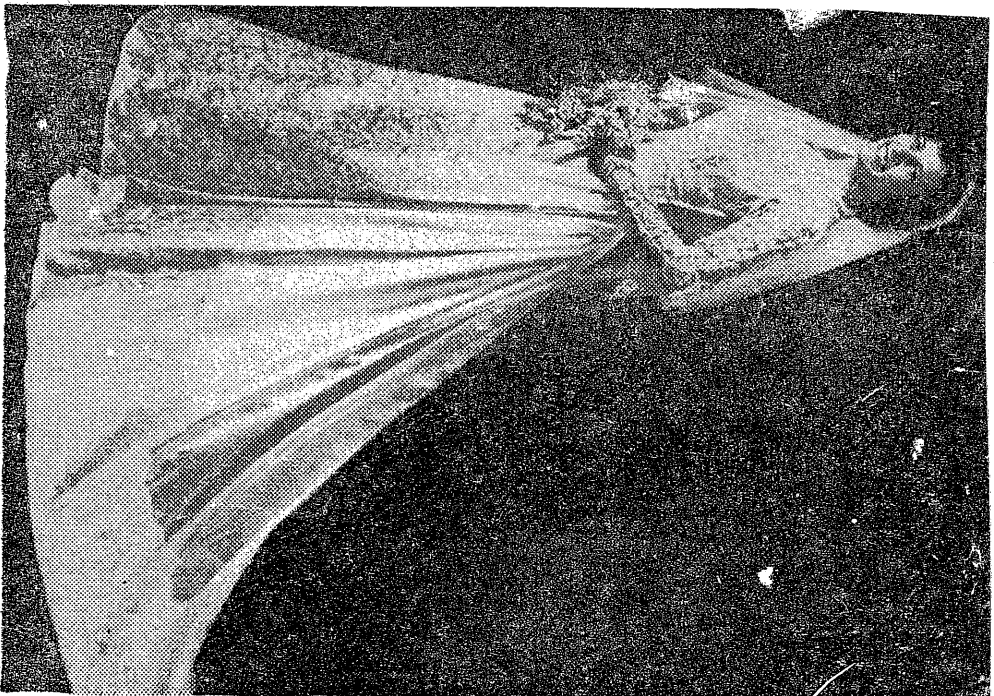

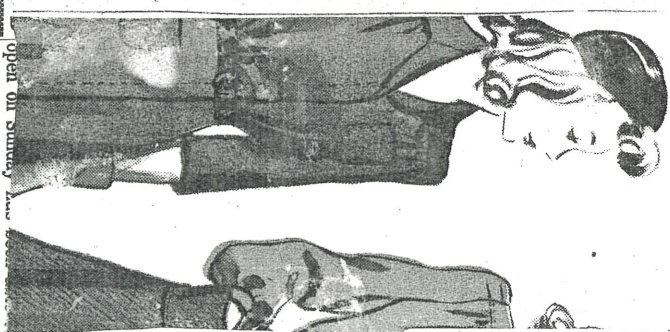
She gave this account of the events leading to the request for issuance of the warrant:

Holly Springs Friends Begin New Era Of Growth

 After the Friends abandoned their first location they chose the one now used. It consists of 50 acres and was a land grant to Benjamin Cox "for the use of the society of people called Quakers" by Richard Caswell, the first governor of North Carolina. This same 50 acres was deeded to the trustees and their successors by Benjamin Cox, thus preventing the sale of the land.

The first church house built on this new location was of logs and stood just east of the present cemetery where one of the corner stones can yet be seen. Tradition says this building was burned.

A new frame building was erected around 1830. This building stood until 1890 when the house now soon to be torn away was erected.

The Meeting House south of Ramseur has been known as Holly Springs since 1769 for it is recorded by that name in the Cane Creek Meeting. It is said that the early pioneers in seeking a name noted a growth of hollies overshadowing a nearby spring and from that they derived the name Holly Springs. The community takes its name from the church.

Several things makes the old meeting house unique. It has seen the transition from the conservative to a modern Friends Meeting. It once had two sections. The division was to meet the need of the times when men and women held separate business meetings. The ceiling still shows where the partition was located. Although the partition divided the men and women from each other, a small door in the gallery permitted notes to pass back and forth to each group.

In past years there were several branches placed so as to face the congregation. These were known as facing benches. Men of zeal or the church and of good repute sat there to keep watch over the flock. It is recorded in the minutes once that the church had good order except for a little "drowsiness." This indicates how serious was

important the work of these men was considered.

A long gallery also extends across the front of the old church. In this gallery sat the resident ministers, visiting ministers or men taking part in the worship. "At Quarterly meeting," a spokesman said, "the gallery on many occasions has been full." This gallery at Holly Springs has the distinction of being the last long gallery for ministers in North Carolina. Yearly Meetings and when the building is torn away an era in one phase of the North Carolina Friends History will come to an end.

The earliest known membership at Holly Springs was brought from Pennsylvania by William Cox in 1752 to Cane Creek. It was left there until the monthly meeting was established. Other prominent names of early years were Moffitt, Barker, Hadley, Corner, Hinshaw, Kemp, Davs and Allen. Descendants of these men still live in the community and are ardent members of the church.

In 1832 members of the community began to migrate to Iowa and Indiana. Holy Springs lost many members then. The group going west was true to their belief and established a Friends Meeting where they settled. Not long ago a group in Indiana celebrated their 100th anniversary and many of the antiquaries on display had been carried from North Carolina.

Because of their belief that it is not right to bear arms, many members of Holly Springs suffered greatly during the War Between the States. Some were punished severely. An account of their suffering is recorded in Fernand's "Southern Heroes." One staunch believer, Thomas Hinshaw, was tied behind a wagon by soldiers who told him he was being taken to be hanged. He still refused to bear arms. The soldiers tied him to a log and tried to get the horses to step on him. Not one horse did. He was subjected to other cruelties but by his forgiving spirit, he gained the confidence of his persecutors. After that the Southern general kept him in

J. Waldo Woody, a retired minister, is a resident member. As new customs and practices were introduced to the Society of Friends at Holly Springs, members of the more conservative group withdrew and formed a new Friends center known as Friendsville.

There were three monthly meetings set up from Holly Springs also. They were Bethel, Prosperity and Needham's Grove. (Needham's is not now active.) These withdrawals took many members, yet the church has over 130 members.

Now Holly Springs is in the final stages of completing a new brick Meeting house. When it is complete the old Meeting house will be torn down or removed and the place where it has stood since 1890 will be used for a lawn and a parking area.

Thus will end another era in the history of Holly Springs Friends.

service but gave him limited duty. Later he was captured by the Northern army and remained a prisoner until the end of the war.

In the early years, Holly Springs believed in administering to the mind as well as the soul. To do this they set up a school near the meeting house. Braxton Craven who was to become the first president of Trinity College (now Duke University), taught there one term. At one time there were six schools under the direction of Holly Springs Friends Meeting. There were: Holly Springs, Bethel, Marlboro, Pine Ridge, Woody's and Tabernacle.

In early years Holly Springs had a well stocked library. Many of these books were brought from Pennsylvania. A few of these books are still in the library. However, many are lost or have been borrowed and are missing. At least one book has the date 1813 written by a quill on its fly leaf.

When the North Carolina Yearly Meeting of Friends adopted the pastoral system generally, Holly Springs continued to depend upon resident and visiting individuals for its ministry. It wasn't until the year 1940 that the church adopted the pastoral plan and Thomas Andrew became the first paid pastor. He was followed by Ed Harris, David Baila, Don Gables, Alie Kemp and Jack Gaughan who is now serving.

Through the years, the church has sent out its members to work in other churches and communities. Among those who were recorded at the church are: Seth Hinshaw, executive secretary of the North Carolina Yearly Meeting who now lives at Guilford College; Alley Kemp, minister at Bethel; Levi Cox, Timothy Cox, Samuel O. Pickett and Nathaniel Cox to name a few.

THE HIGH POINTER OF THE WEEK

D. A. Dowdy

D. A. Dowdy Sr., president and chief owner of 11 drug stores in High Point and nearby towns is a pharmacist whose chief hobby is his profession.

His greatest interest outside his family is boys, especially boys — or girls — whom he can help to become interested in taking up the rewarding career of pharmacy — a profession which he acclaims as a lucrative one and one that provides a future of service and benefit to humanity, easily allied to that of the doctor of medicine.

Dowdy's interest in drugstores and pharmacy began early in his life. As a school boy he helped finance his schooling by delivering drugs before and after school for J. G. Greene Drug Co., and feeding the pony that the late John G. Greene, owner of the store, kept for the special pleasure of his daughter, Elsie, now Mrs. Holt McPherson.

Dowdy speaks with highest praise and warmest appreciation of the contribution Greene made to his life during the eight or more years he worked for him. Greene had been a school teacher, and he applied the same wisdom in teaching and training the many young boys who worked for him that he had used in the school room. From these early years Dowdy never wavered from his determination to become a pharmacist.

Spinks Dowdy was a farmer, but he also engaged in work closely identified with Moore County—he was a potter; and on his potter's wheel he turned pitchers, jugs, cups, and other earthen vessels for which Moore County has won international fame.

The articles Dowdy made he hauled in a wagon through the surrounding country, and sold, most of them for five cents each. An earthen churn, however, brought twenty-five cents!

Mr. and Mrs. Dowdy, with their seven children, later moved to High Point. Of the six brothers and sisters only two survive: G. R. Dowdy, of Asheville, who though retired, is still in demand because of his skill in wood finishing and carving; and M. T. Dowdy, a well known member of the High Point police force.

D. A. Dowdy received his early education in High Point, graduating from High Point High School in 1915. Then there was a period of 13 months when he again found financial help and encouragement by working in Greene's drug store before going to the School of Pharmacy of the University of North Carolina for the year 1916-1917.

Growth

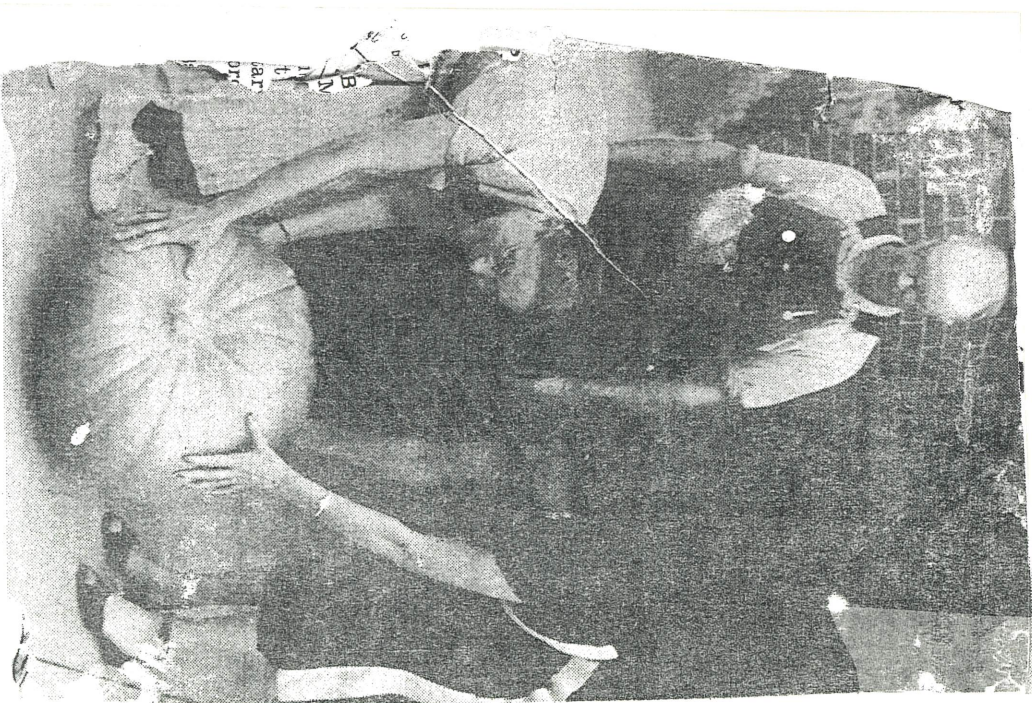

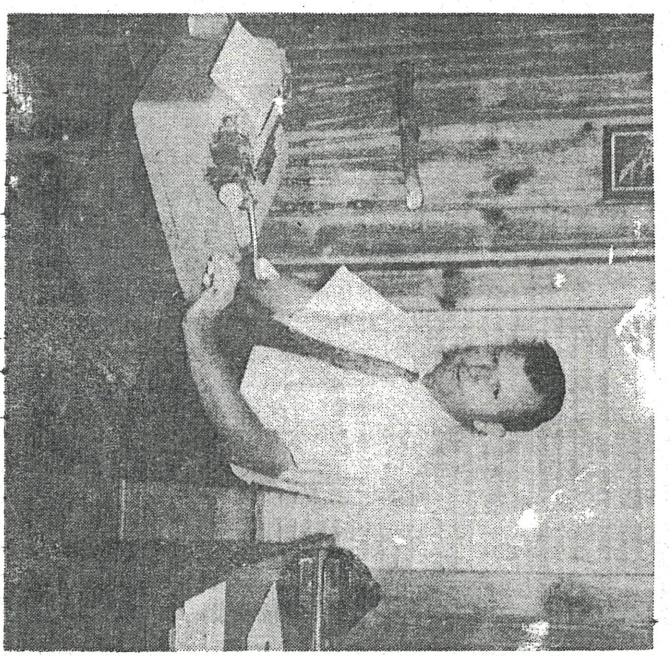

Couple Celebrate Birthdays On Holidays

On Lincoln's birthday, February 12, James Jason (Dick) Hill, a handle bar-mustached basket maker, celebrated his 86th birthday, while on Valentine's Day, February 14, his wife, Tilda Callicutt, a woman with a delightfully spicy sense of humor, will celebrate her 82nd birthday at their home on Route 3, Asheboro.

The house in which they reside in West Cedar Grove township, directly west of Hopewell Friends church, is known as the "White House" and the original portion of the house is believed to be 200 years old. The house derived its name from the belief that it was the first house in Randolph county to be painted white.

Mr. and Mrs. Hill observed their 63rd wedding anniversary on last December 16 and the sprightly Mrs. Hill remarked that "It is a long time for two old folks to live together."

Dick Hill as he is familiarly and affectionately known, started making baskets around ten years ago. Since that time his skill and proficiency in the trade has grown to the extent that today his baskets are going out to all parts of the country.

The basket making originated with the need of Mr. Hill for some baskets for his own use. The idea grew and soon afterwards he began making baskets for other people. He had always made his baskets out of White Oak splits until a short while ago, at the near age of 86, he innovated a new angle into his business, that of making baskets out of honeysuckle vines.

Mr. Hill was born in the vicinity of Carraway Mountain, near the line of Back Creek and Tabernacle townships. His folks moved from place to place and at the time of the school which he

out for a new start at growing boxwoods. One boxwood which was sold a few years ago measured 45 feet around and 8 feet high.

They have lived for 47 years at what was originally known as the Brookshire place. It has been established that the front part of the house was built two centuries ago.

One upstairs room is in the same condition as it was originally built and has not been changed or altered in any way. Mrs. Hill said that a man came by several years ago and wanted to buy that room and remove it from the remainder of the house. The room is constructed with wide boards, in the floor and in the ceiling of

The making of baskets by Mr. Hill is strictly a one man operation and is done exclusively by hand. He cuts the trees, uses a maul and wedge to split them up, taking a drawing knife to slice off the splints and then uses his pocket knife to grain them out. A hand made sander, rigged up from an old plane and bit, is used for the sanding of the splints.

Besides making baskets, Mr. Hill also puts splint bottoms in chairs.

Mrs. Hill is not exactly idle during the industriousness of her husband and for more than 20 years she has been taking rugs, center pieces and other things of that nature.

She said that she first learned to knit on broom straws. However, this activity by Mrs. Hill is not sufficient, especially since the disposal of the chickens and livestock, and she complains, "We ain't got nothing to tend."

The Hills are also known for the boxwoods which used to be predominant at their place. They have now been sold but a row of spigs have been put in of the room both on the side and the overhead.

Mr. Hill has suffered from a weakness for several years due to this factor, it is hard for these two octogenarians to converse satisfactorily with each other. But, after 63 years of a closely knit life together, there is a transmission stronger than words between them.

She Retains A Sense Of Humor

Mrs. Shaw Observes Her 96th Birthday

"I HAVE worked in this old world," flatly declared Mrs. Margaret Hancock Shaw, as she celebrated her 96th birthday on Saturday, March 3.

But despite long years of hard work and nearly 13 years of invalidism, due to a hip injury, Mrs. Shaw has retained a sense of humor which brings forth some choice expressions in a conversation with her.

She is a patient at Wood's Rest Home on North Main St. in Asheboro and it is there where her family gathered last Sunday for the observance of her birthday.

Born on March 3, 1866, shortly after the end of the Civil War, as Margaret Felane Hancock, she was the next to the youngest of five children of John Hancock and Sara Jane Luther Hancock. She is now the only member of her family still living.

Told that she had a pretty name, she quickly retorted: "If it wasn't, I am pretty." Asked if she grew up on a farm, she said: "I was pulled up on one."

Her birth occurred in Montgomery county, six or eight miles this side of Troy, in the Macedonia church section. Her father she doesn't remember, as he died soon after the war as a result of activities during the war.

One of her first remembrances, and she remembers it clearly today, was her family moving to Randolph county soon after her father's death to the Mt. Lebanon Baptist church section near the Randolph-Montgomery line where her mother had formerly lived.

Times were hard following the war and worse still, her mother had the responsibility of rearing the five children which had been left fatherless by the death of her husband. Therefore, the children had to start to work early and Mrs. Shaw says that "I made a hand of binding wheat when I was 10 years old." She also said "I plowed some."

In relating to this reporter and a daughter of her earlier activity and work, Mrs. Shaw was reproved by her daughter when she slyly remarked, "I worked like the Devil," laughing when she said it.

She attended Welch's school, located at the present site of the Mt. Lebanon church, and

although she said she didn't have to "sit on the dunce block or get a scolding. I was the meanest." Asked as to how she got by, she said "I watched the teacher."

ANOTHER remembrance of this elderly woman's childhood was her ability to climb trees, regardless of how high the limbs were. She said: "I could go anywhere a squirrel could go."

Mrs. Shaw was married to her husband, Elijah Albert Shaw, on May 10, 1896, soon after the death of her mother, and he died on July 4, 1949. After their marriage they moved to the Strieby section a few miles to the north and it was there that Mrs. Shaw lived until she came to the rest home in Asheboro.

Six children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Shaw, with the oldest one, Barton E. Shaw, dying at the age of 23. The others are Mrs. G. C. Reynolds, of Asheboro; Mrs. F. T. Williams, of Route 1, Mt. Gilthead; Miss Dora Shaw, of Route 5, Asheboro; Miss Emma Lee Shaw, of Route 1, Mt. Gilthead;

and she depreciatingly replied: "I couldn't find nobody that was sorry enough to have me." Asked if she remembered the day she got married, she added to the question by saying "The day I went into trouble."

Mrs. Shaw's husband was a farmer, operated a store and also dealt in timber during his lifetime. The only surviving son of Mr. and Mrs. Snaw, Alvin Shaw, also operates a store in the same vicinity at the present time.

A long time member of the Mt. Lebanon Baptist church, across the field from which Mrs. Shaw lived prior to her marriage, she remembers her baptism in the river above the old covered bridge which is being preserved in that vicinity. The minister performing the baptism was the Rev. Martin Leesch.

A STRONG woman, both in will and strength, a daughter of Mrs. Shaw says that her mother worked in the fields and cleared the banks of ditches and other areas with a hand scythe up to the age of 60.

She worked tremendously hard up to the time of her disability but has managed to throw off her hardships and worries by a strong sense of humor and a manner of teasing. She joked about her birthday and upon being asked as to how old she was on her birthday, she said "about 75." Pressing her on this point, this reporter asked if she wasn't around 90 and she said "I am going up that way."

The only reference Mrs. Shaw made to the present was during a discussion of the birthday celebration which was planned for her on the day following her actual birth date. While the others were talking about plans for the next day, she said: "There'll be a crowd here tomorrow."

But this aged woman, a pioneer of her day, becomes very vocal when the conversation turns back to the time when she played, worked, went to school and church in the days of her childhood near the Randolph-Montgomery line in the southeastern part of this county.

Asheboro Friends Meeting To Lay Cornerstone Of New Worship House

A service of consecration and the laying of the cornerstone of the sturdily built new structure of the Asheboro Friends Meeting will be held Sunday, March 6, at the site of the new building at the corner of East Kivett and South Main Streets.

The service of consecration will begin at 11 a.m. in the worship room, beautiful in its simple designing, non-symbolic appearance and its following of the traditional Quaker lines of architecture, with Seth B. Hinshaw, former Minister of the Asheboro Friends Meeting and now Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Yearly Meeting, giving the address of consecration.

Also participating in the service of consecration will be Algie I. Newlin, Clerk of the North Carolina Yearly Meeting; Clyde Hinshaw, Clerk of the Southern Quarterly Meeting; and John Kemp, Clerk of the Asheboro Friends Monthly Meeting.

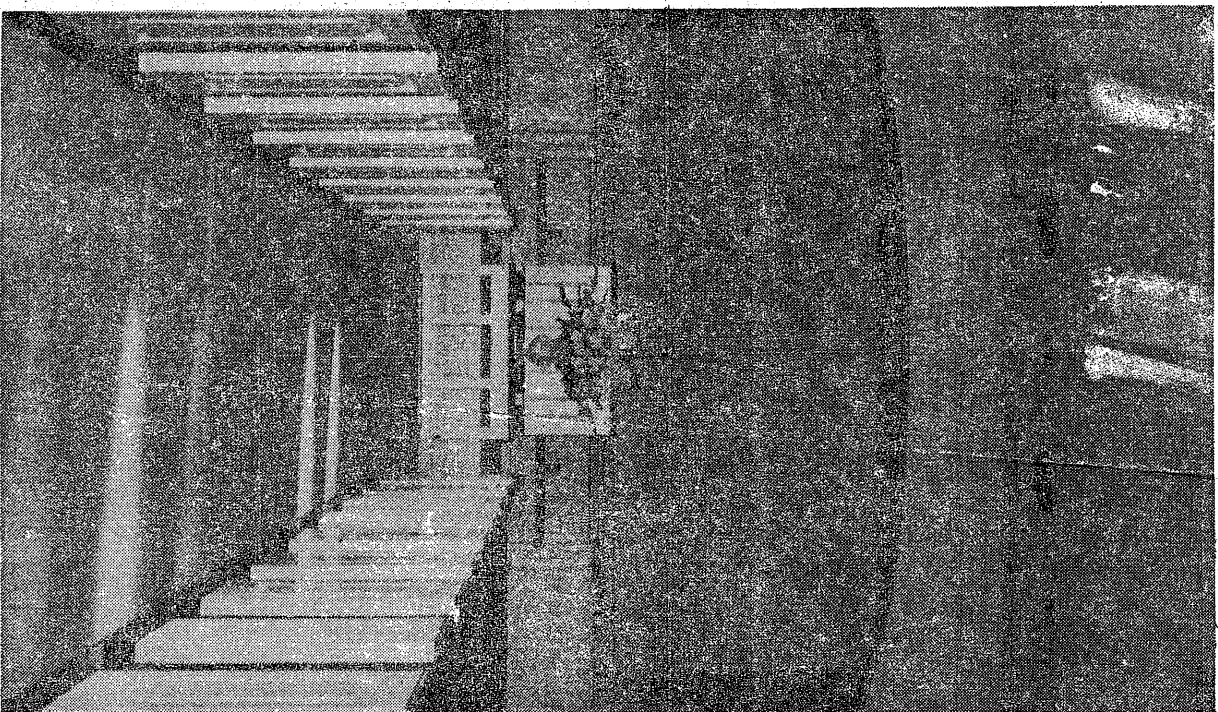
Recognition will be accorded during the service to the two living charter members of the Asheboro Friends Meeting, Nettie Lewallen and Fannie Johnson. Presiding over the service of consecration will be the Minister of the Asheboro Friends Meeting, Bascom G. Rollins.

At the conclusion of the service in the worship room, the cornerstone of the new building will be laid in a service to be held on the west front side of the building.

Ground breaking for the new building was held on Sunday, November 2, 1958, the first service in the new building was held on Sunday, January 3, 1960 and an open house, planned for Sunday, February 14, was moved up to Sunday, February 21, because of bad weather.

A building committee was named in October, 1953 and a fund started towards the building of a 1 1/2 worship room at the old site of the Asheboro Friends Meeting on Hoover St. A three-story brick educational building, containing twenty-two classrooms, had been erected at the Hoover St. site in 1937, the plan at that time being to remain at that site.

However, a decision was later made to build on a new site and in early 1956 a tract of land, containing two and one-half acres, was purchased at the corner of East Kivett and South Main Streets and plans were formulated for the erection of a new building on that site.

The educational building is comprised of a fellowship hall, 23 class rooms, 7 rest rooms, a church parlor, library, church office and pastor's study. The fellowship hall has a seating capacity of over 250 and is also used as an adult assembly. Other departments also have their own assembly rooms.

New furnishings prevailed throughout the Sunday School department. Each department has its own color design which is followed throughout the rooms at the department. Color schemes for the educational buildings were compiled by a color expert representing one of the paint companies. Matching colors in the educational buildings in cherry paneling and across a hallway, finished in yellow pine paneling is the church parlor, a veritable scene of beauty and splendor. The parlor walls are painted in beige, with the same color being followed in the nylon carpet on the floor and the draw drapes at the windows.

The furniture is of a contemporary style except the tables which are of French Provincial. Pieces in the room include two love seats, a couch and matching chair, an odd chair, a desk, a drop leaf table and two chairs, a drum table and two end tables. The building, which includes 20,000 square feet of floor space, also has a modern kitchen of considerable space, fully equipped, and an automatic gas fired hot water heating system. The heating system of the building is so arranged that the different sections of the building can be heated separately.

S. E. Trogdon and Sons of Asheboro were contractors for the construction of the building and actually drew up the original plans for the building. Following the approval of the plans by the Asheboro Friends Meeting, an architect from Raleigh, Charles W. Davis, applied the finishing touches to the plans for the building.

In contrast to the commodious facilities and the current strong membership of the Asheboro Friends Meeting, the group had a very small beginning back in June, 1913. At that time a number of Friends families, who had originally come from older Meeting Houses such as Back Creek, Science Hill, Hopewell, Marlboro and Cane Creek, were living in Asheboro and asked Ada Lee, a woman Friends Minister from Archdale, to come and meet with them.

Ada Lee came down and preached to a gathering of Friends and others at the First Baptist church. A month later she came back for another meeting with them, this time at the Presbyterian church. In September Ada Lee was called to become the first Minister to the newly organized group and upon an invitation from the Presbyterian church, the Sunday School and prayer meetings of the group were held at that church. A separate meeting was held for worship and the Friends met for this purpose in the old armory hall which was located on Sunset Ave.

Soon after the organization of the group, another woman Friend, Minister Milner Angel Cox held a successful revival meeting for the group which helped them get off to a good start.

In 1915 the group organized themselves into an independent Monthly Meeting and in the same year erected a small frame structure on Hoover St., on a lot which was given to them by C. J. Cox and Virgil Pressnell.

Later a basement was added to the Sunday School rooms were built a small annex erected and in 1948 the educational building was constructed. Worship at the same site continued through Sunday, December 27, 1959, when the last service was held at the old site.

The Asheboro Friends Meeting began with 16 charter members and one associate member. The members were Eleazer Winslow, Hannah Winslow, Albin Lowe, Mattie Lowe, Ida Phillips, Elwood Cox, Mary A. Cox, Irvin T. Cox, Milner A. Cox, Leonta Cox, Nettie Lewallen, J. S. (John) Tiller, Ella Bowman, Coy Hamilton, Braxton Gagle, Van Neal, the present clerk, John Kemp, Cephus Bowman and Albin Lowe served as clerks at different times.

Ministers of the Asheboro Friends Meeting have been Lee Stanley, evidently Ada married following her first to the Asheboro Friends Meeting and Elwood Cox, Milner A. E. Reece, Joseph Peele, Ryan, Alvin C. Barrett, Thos. F. Andrew, Clarence Moore, George Moore, Calvin L. Perry, John M. Permar, H. A. Parker, D. Virgil Pike, S. Hinshaw, David O. Stanfield, the present Minister, Bascom Rollins.

A vital factor in the growth of the Asheboro Friends Meeting throughout the year 1959, existence has been the presence of a group of the Meeting which is now known as the United Society of Friends Women's Society of the North Carolina Yearly Meeting. The group organized in 1916 and the time was known as the Aid Society. Ella Bowman was the first president. Only charter members of that group are Fannie Johnson, Nettie Lewallen and Callie P. Wood, who served at various times as president of the women's group, is in her third year as president of the United Society of Friends Women's Society.

From the Ladies Aid Society the name was changed to the name of the present organization upon the reorganization of the group a few years ago. The present designation was given to the group by the women in the Aid Society. Meeting. Six circles, the Quaker Maid a youth and children's group are included in the man's organization. A dual celebration was held for the Rev. and Mrs. B. B. Bulla, of Route 1, Sophia, who were married fifty years ago on December 29, 1909.

The first one was held in Burlington on Sunday, December 27, where eleven years of their half century of married life had been spent and the second and larger one was held Sunday, January 3, at the Marlboro Friends Meeting House.

Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Thomas, of Route 1, Burlington, were the hosts for the first celebration, to which relatives and friends in that area were invited to attend.

Their daughters, Mrs. John W. Dyer, of Route 1, High Point, and Mrs. John R. Albertson, of High Point, were hostesses for the informal occasion last Sunday afternoon which was held in the basement rooms of the historic old meeting house near to where they live and the church with which they are affiliated.

Besides the two daughters, the 76 year-old minister and his 73 year-old wife have a son, Johnny Bulla, of Phoenix, Arizona, an internationally known golfer, and also seven grandchildren. Another son, Meredith Bulla, died in 1942.

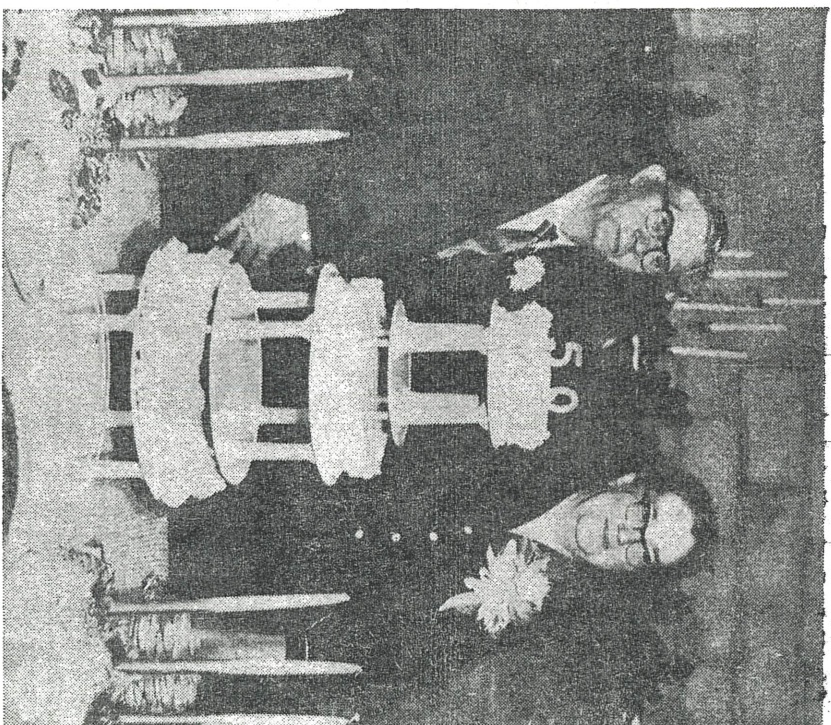
Although a native of Randolph county, who long ago came back to his native soil, the ministry of Baud Bulla extended through seven states before his leaving of the pastorate of the Holly Springs Meeting House nine years ago, at which place he retired from the active ministry of his denomination.

At the time he left the Holly Springs pastorate, the congregation there had offered him a place with the church for as long as he lived. But he had been there for six years and felt that his work was over at that place. However, he still regards his work at Holly Springs as one of the most satisfying of his ministerial experiences.

He and his wife, who was also once a licensed minister, have held pastoral work in North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Wisconsin. Besides the Quaker faith, with which they began and with which they ended their active labors, they have also been affiliated with the Nazarene, Pilgrim Holiness and Apostolic Holiness denominations. Mrs. Bulla often occupied the pulpit of the various churches and her husband said that "she has been a better preacher than I've been."

Churches other than the Holly Springs congregation at which the Rev. and Mrs. Bulla have served in Randolph county have been the Marlboro church, scene of childhood recollection for Mr. Bulla and where members of his family are interred, supply work at the Plainfield Friends Meeting House close to where he grew to young manhood, and the Science Hill Friends Meeting House.

It was on November 12, 1883 that Baud Baxter Bulla was born into the home of Daniel Webster (Manebb) Bulla and

for a few years, he enrolled at Guilford College. Then after another interval of being out of school, he became a student at God's Bible School in Cincinnati, Ohio.

It was at this latter school that he became acquainted with Eva Dovie Taylor who had enrolled at the school a few weeks earlier and who was to become his wife before they left the school four years later.

Mrs. Bulla had been born in Santa Ana, Calif. on October 11, 1886, the daughter of Levi and Elizabeth Taylor. Her parents were originally residents of Ohio but before her birth had come to California because of her father's health. But when she was a small child the family moved back to their native state and were living in Piqua, Ohio at the time she felt the call of Christian work and enrolled at the school in Cincinnati, Ohio.

They were married a short while before they left the school which they had attended for four years. The wedding occurred at Troy, Ohio where they had planned to be married in a Nazarene church.

However, the plans of these soon-to-be-ministers failed to materialize and they were married at the home of friends, with the gentleman of the house being a magistrate and officiating at the marriage. They remember that the weather was 16 degrees below zero, so cold that the street cars had quit running and they had to walk the mile and one half to the site of their wedding.

Immediately after leaving school, they took their first pastorate at Hartsville, Ohio, a town which has since been swept away by flood waters. Their active ministry continued since that time, with a few brief intervals, until their retirements nine years ago. They have lived at their present residence for the past 19

years. Mrs. Bulla is still carried as a member of the North Carolina Yearly Meeting.

Asked as to what he was doing since his retirement, Mr. Bulla with dry humor said that he was doing "about as near nothing as I can." But, actually, this man whose ministry extended across the country, hasn't quit work and he is still engaged in pursuing the causes which have kept him busy all of these years.

Retirement for Mrs. Bulla has been far from what she would imply. She has spent her time, particularly the last five years, in making quilts for missionary enterprises overseas. She has no record of "how many" quilts she has made but she has probably go into the hundreds. Last year she made 28 regular size quilts and 17 baby quilts. Her quilts go out through the facilities of the Oriental Missionary Society in Los Angeles, Calif., the World Vision Corp. and other groups.

But, according to a friend from Burlington and people in the Sophia area, the quilts made for missionaries are of a quality that Mrs. Bulla has helped to spread the gospel. They cite many other types of service which has been rendered by this youthful looking, pleasant appearing woman who felt the call many years ago to definite Christian service. Eva Bulla's work is far from being over and she continues steadily and consistently in response to the challenge which she heard over a half century ago.

A prominent Friends minister and a former official in the Society of Friends also spoke of the unselfish service of Baud Bulla and of his persistence in putting the welfare of the church ahead of his own personal gain.

Thus, Baud and Eva Bulla, known for their compassion, their benevolence and their interest in their fellow man, have

Railroad Wreck Halts Train No. 55 For Day; Service Resumes Saturday

Rail service was resumed Saturday morning on the Carolina and Northwestern High Point-Asheboro route following a one-day delay caused by the derailment of six cars of Train No. 55 near its Asheboro arrival time of 11 a.m. Saturday morning.

The derailment turned over five box cars.

Engineer W. C. Nicholson of Spencer said that the accident apparently was caused by a broken rail, as the diesel engine and one box car passed over the rail before it snapped.

The tanker was considered a prime source of danger, as Highway Patrolman and Sheriff's deputies formed a cordon about the scene. Nicholson said the tanker contained several thousand gallons of highly inflammable butane gas, originally headed for an Asheboro firm.

All of the derailed cars carried loads destined for the Asheboro area, Nicholson said. About 10 freight cars, including numerous coal carriers, remained upright but were blocked by the derailed cars.

Nicholson said that his five-man crew escaped without injury, as all but one were in the engine when the wreck occurred. The other man was in the caboose, well away from the wrecked cars, the engineer added.

A railway derrick-wrecker was brought from Spencer, and the wrecked cars were lifted from their cross-tracks position and a new section of tracks was laid into place.

Beloved Educator Dies At Her Home

Miss Ada Blair, a pioneer educator in the founding of High Point's public school system and one of the city's leading women, died at her home on S. Main Street at 8:05 a.m. today.

Miss Blair was 92 years old. She had been ill only since yesterday afternoon.

Despite her age, Miss Blair maintained a keen interest in the affairs of the city, the schools, her church and the many community and civic organizations of which she was a member. Only last week, she attended a meeting of the United Society of Friends Women, of which she was a member.

A member of one of High Point's and Guilford County's pioneer families in the field of education, Miss Blair was a teacher for 52 years of her life. She served in the public schools of High Point as both a teacher and a principal for 31 years.

Bears Her Name

The old Grimes Street School, of which she was the first principal, was renamed the Ada Blair School in her honor in 1921. Emma Blair School was named for Miss Blair's twin sister, who was also a teacher. Miss Emma Blair died March 2, 1949.

Miss Blair was born in High Point June 4, 1864, in a house that is still standing behind the present home at 1818 S. Main St. She was the daughter of S. I. Blair and Abigail Hunt Blair. Her great-grandfather, Nathan Hunt, was one of the founders of New Garden Boarding School, which later became Guilford College. Both Miss Blair's father and mother attended the school, and her father was one of the early teachers at the Quaker institution.

Miss Blair, along with her twin sister, attended Westown School and New Garden Boarding School (now Guilford College), and in 1888 she began her career as a teacher. She taught for two years at Oak Forest School in Randolph County near Trinity and for one year in Reidsville. Then, for a period of 13 years, from 1891 until 1904, she taught in the schools in Goldsboro.

At Elm Street

She returned to Guilford County in 1904 as a teacher in the preparatory department at Guilford College. In 1908, she came to High Point as a teacher at the old Elm Street

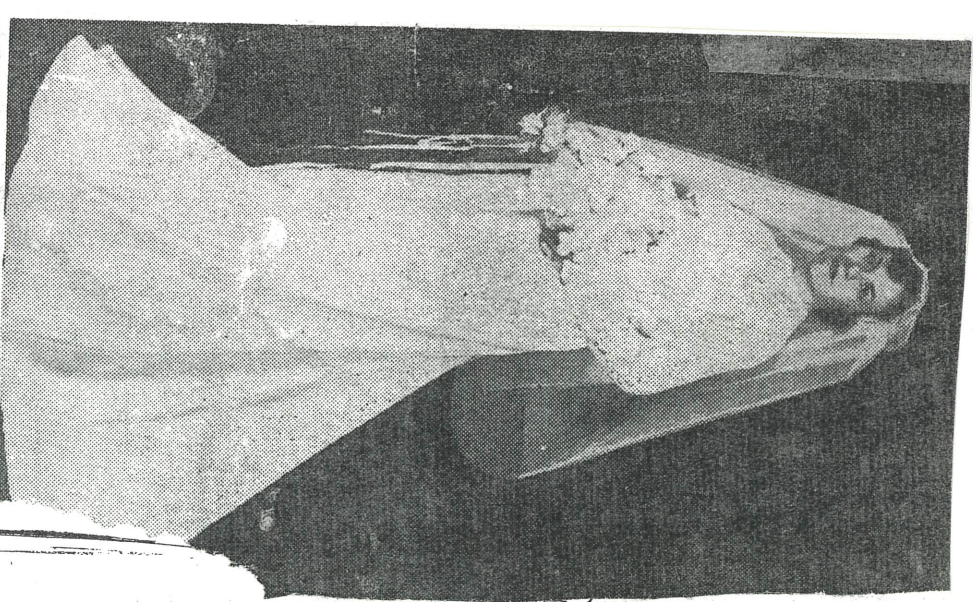

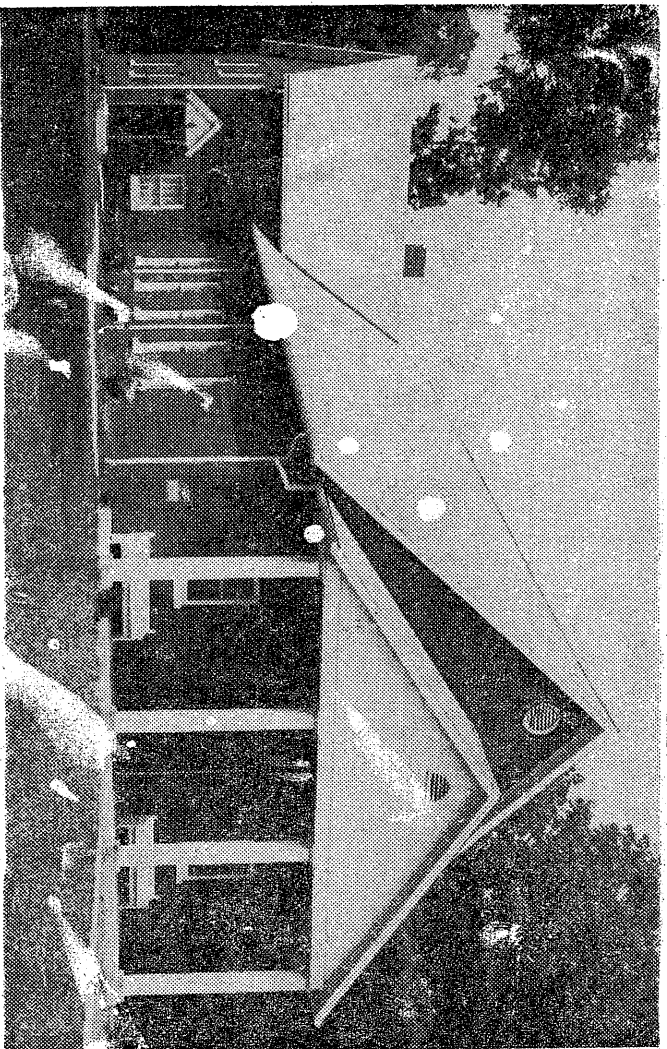

Centre Church Dedication To Be Held Next Sunday

When members of the Centre Friends Church gather next Sunday to dedicate their new meeting house, the congregation may pause to remember a particular verse of a poem written by one of their members:

"They've built another country church,
The passer-by will say,
And hardly give a second glance
As he speeds on his way."

But behind the new brick facade of the beautiful church which is located on N. C. 62 just east of Highway 200 and 12 miles south of Greensboro, is a story of perseverance, of faith and of love of God and man.

Old Story

It is a story that began more than 200 years ago when a Quaker pioneer, William Hockett, tired from his long journey from Pennsylvania, tied his horse to a sapling three miles east of Pole Cat Creek.

Hockett met some friendly Indians who persuaded him to stay on. Soon he had bought land and the settlement was known as Centre.

And in 1757 Centre Friends began to hold meetings in the community. The need for a central place of worship soon became evident and a log meetinghouse was built in 1763. The church prospered. Later there was a school on the site.

A second and larger church was built. By 1879 another was constructed as the congregation continued to grow. Through all the years the Quakers looked upon their meeting as the center of friendship and of family. The community soon reached the point where yet a larger building was needed to accommodate them all.

New Building

And that is the building that will plot in the church cemetery. It is dedicated next Sunday in an all-day affair. Seth Hinshaw, executive secretary of North Carolina after several years declining. Orval Dillon, former pastor and a serious illness. member of the building committee will be speakers.

Although the present minister, A. Willard Mendenhall, is not officially listed on the program as a speaker, friends of the church will more than likely ask him to say a few words in view of his close association with the group. 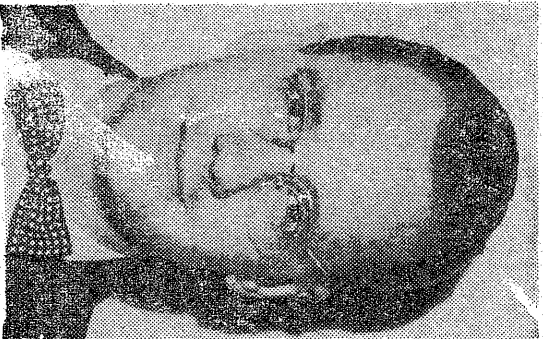

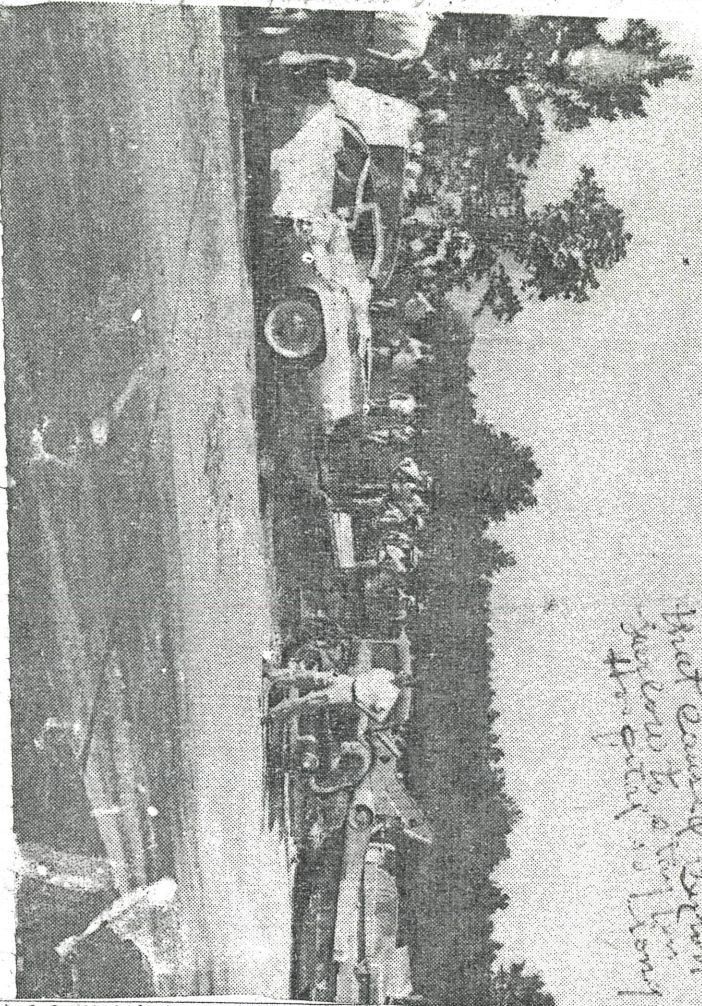

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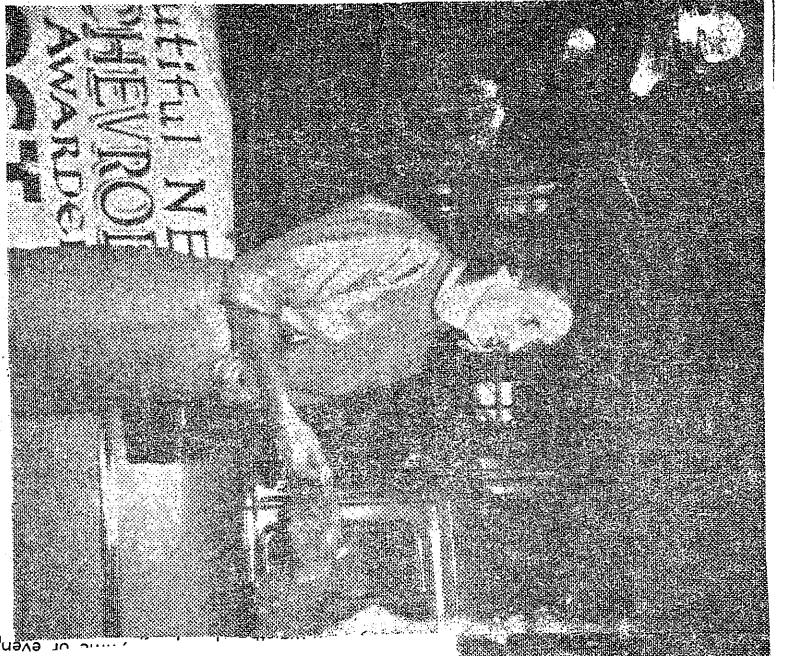

Leaving Many Friends

Youngsters Bound For Orphanage Home

Four young children, whose lives had become intertwined with the hearts and lives of the people of North Ashboro, left Monday to live at the Hepzhbah Children's Home at Macon, Ga.

Although they left with a year of tragedy behind them, the four Swaney children, Richard, 13, Susan, 12, Rosa Louise, 10, and Katherine Dail, 5, went happily with the assurance that they would remain together, united in a home of excellent care, love and Christian guidance.

They went with their kind friend and benefactor, the Rev. Paul E. Alired, who had steered them through the illness and death of their mother, the hospitalization of their father and a period in which they required constant care and attention.

They left behind them Mrs. Eviias McDowell, the neighbor from across the street who had come to regard them as her very own, the people at the Neighbors Grove Wesleyan Methodist church who had responded to their every need, and the people of the North Ashboro community, the other churches and industrial plants whose hearts had been touched by the tragedies which had befallen them.

Over two years ago, Dewey Swaney was the victim of an accident which left him paralyzed for life. After months of hospitalization, he was sent to a rehabilitation center in Fishersville, Va., leaving his wife and four small children to carry on without his aid and assistance.

Despite the absence of the husband and father, things went well with Mrs. Swaney and the children, they were buying a small house at 2113 Flint St. in North Ashboro, they bought a car and life seemed to be normal for them. Then, Mrs. Swaney became ill and went to the hospital at Chapel Hill for surgery.

No Arrests Expected In Woman's Death

Sheriff's officers said today that "No arrests are expected" in the strange death of a 28-year old Route 1, Julian beatstick last Thursday night. Deputies revealed during the weekend that A. C. Weaver of 117 Arlington street, Greensboro, had been questioned in connection with the case. Weaver, 40, see Ruby Koeler Clapp, they victim, alive.

The young woman, who lived just inside Guilford county line, near the Randolph county line, was found dead Friday morning by Weaver, who said he had left her out of his car at Hunter's Bridge, 12 miles southeast of Greensboro on Alamance road.

When found, Miss Clapp was lying at the bottom of a steep, rocky embankment. Weaver told officers:

Guilford county coroner Dr. W. W. Harvey, who examined her body, said death apparently resulted from the lack of medical aid after the woman received a ruptured spleen and kidney, probably in the fall. The post-mortem indicated that at death, Harvey said, that Miss Clapp was technically sober. Weaver had told officers that the woman had ridden round with him for several hours on Thursday night, and that she was so intoxicated that she could hardly sit up."

At her insistence, he said, he set her out of the car at Hunter's Bridge and continued on. The next day, on not finding her at home, he said he went to the scene and found the body. Deputies said the car had not yet been close, but at the present time, they said, they have no evidence of foul play.

Two Suicides Occur Only Minutes Apart

Two suicides yesterday, one in Guilford and one in Randolph, occurred within minutes of each other and both resulted from shotgun blasts through the head, it was reported early today.

The body of John McKinley White, 68, Randolph County farmer, was found about 200 yards from his home on Route 1, Sophia, at around 3 p.m. yesterday. Jesse Thomas Patterson, 28, an electrician who lived just outside Greensboro, was found dead at his home at 3:30 p.m.

Randolph deputies reported White's body was found by Gilbert Davis, a neighbor. It lay, they added, at the side of the road leading to White's home, and the shotgun was found a few feet from the body.

A High Point ambulance was summoned to the scene and brought the body to the local hospital, where White was pronounced dead.

Deputies said the weapon, a double-barrelled 12-gauge shotgun, had only one spent shell in it when they examined it. The ruling of suicide came from the office of the Randolph County coroner.

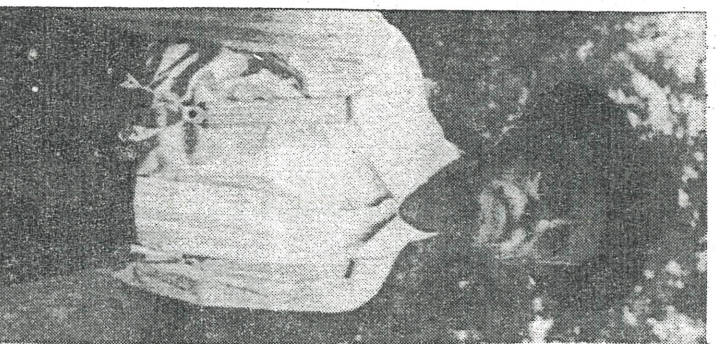

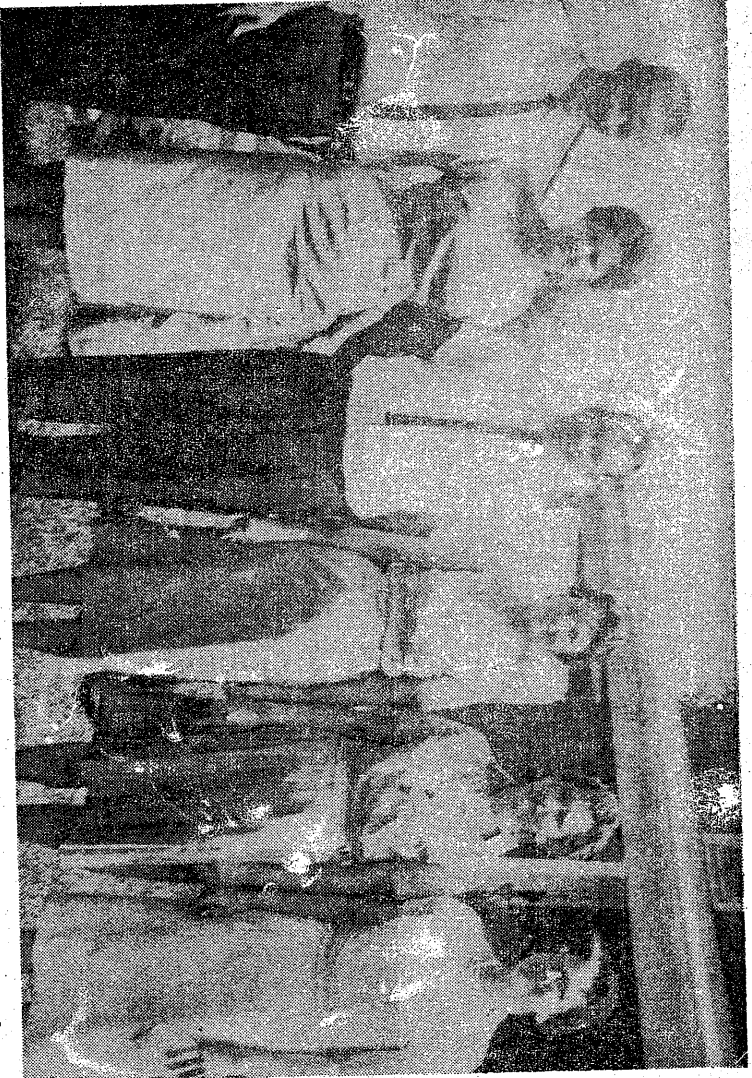

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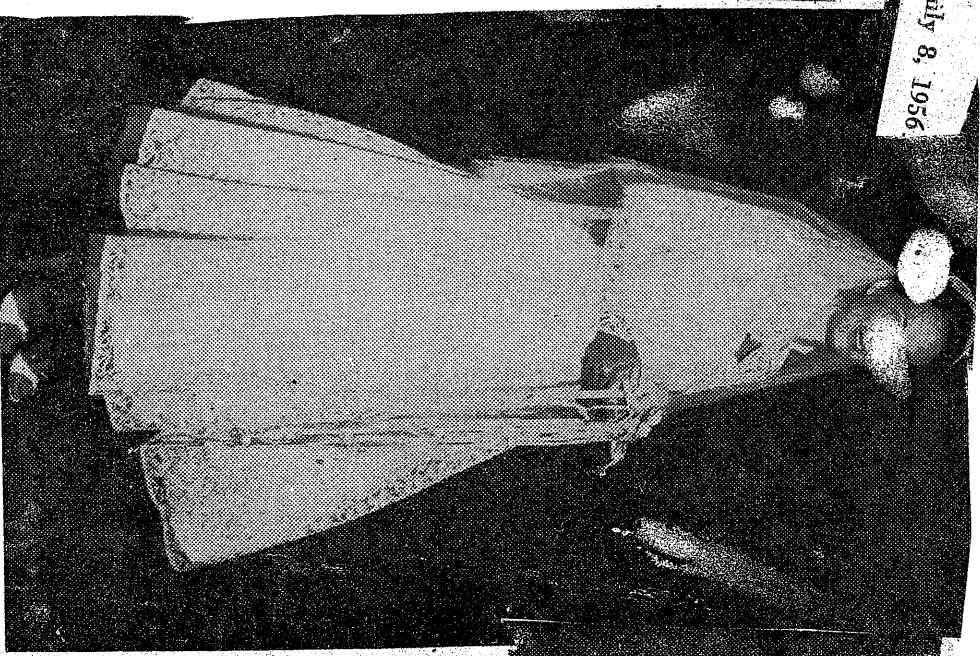

Sympathy is extended to the family of Vernon Sawyer, over 80, whose funeral was held at Marlboro on Monday afternoon of last week.

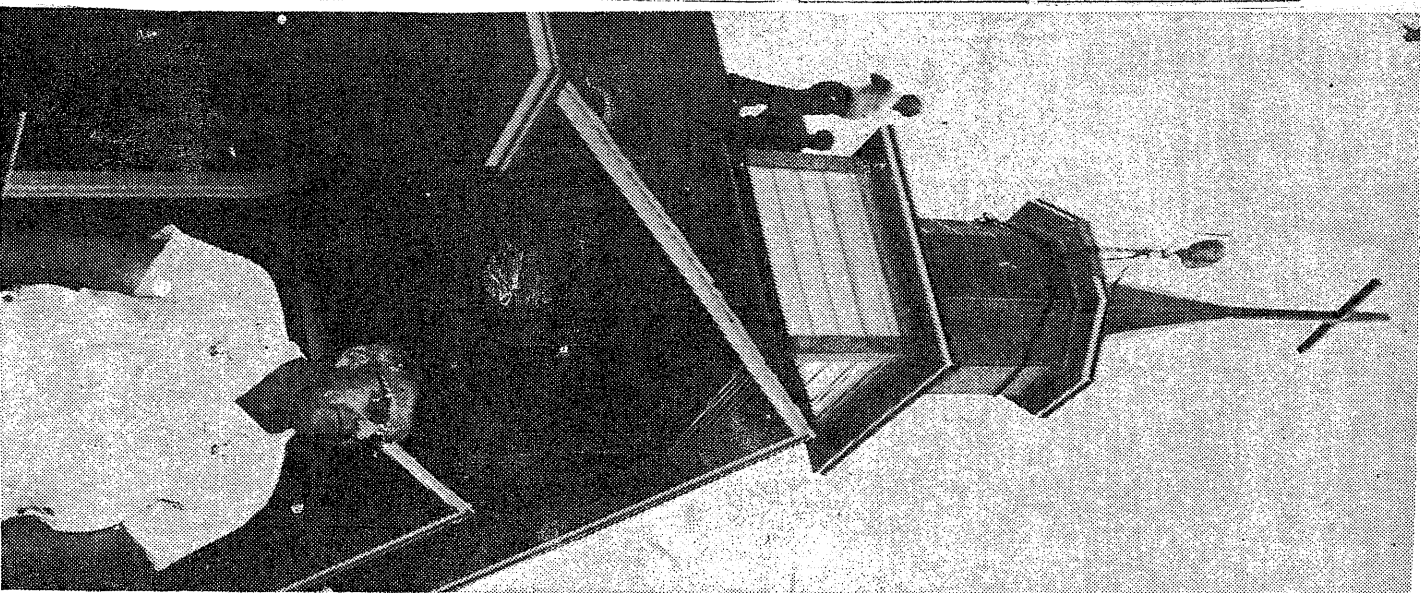
